Introductions

Lomond Park is a leading tennis club in the East of Scotland. The current membership can look back with gratitude to its predecessors, who had the initial vision, and later the courage and spirit in the most challenging of circumstances, to preserve the Club and develop it into the excellent facility that we all enjoy today.

At the turn of the 20th century local residents in Trinity joined together to protect the amenity of the parkland from developers through the formation of The Lomond Park Company Limited, which has preserved the park as a recreation area to this day.

The amalgamation of Lomond Park and Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1921 was an ideal marriage. Lomond Park had access to the ground for tennis court development, and the Trinity Club brought with it considerable wealth, and the combined club had an enviable playing strength. The Club's newly found reserves provided the resource to install a red blaes surface on the three lower courts and create the upper courts in the same material. Later, the clubhouse facilities were extended to meet the needs of the expanded Club.

The Club has survived the challenges of two World Wars, The Great Depression and the Global Covid Pandemic. The end of World War II hostilities found the Club in a state of near bankruptcy, and but for the intervention of the parent organization, Trinity Recreation Club Limited, and the efforts of a loyal group of members in the post war period the Club would not exist today.

Increased competition from other sports in the late 1960s and early 70s again brought the viability of the Club into question. After much thought, the Club took a calculated financial gamble to borrow a substantial sum of money to invest in five low maintenance all-weather court that would support year-round play then the addition of floodlights. This proved to be a turning point for the Club and the replacement surface in 1991, of the new technology Artificial Sand Filled Grass courts proved popular and the membership built to today's healthy levels.

The Club now enters its second century with the publication of this Club history, which we hope has succeeded in capturing some of the spirit that inspired the Club over these years. We owe a debt of gratitude to **Clive** for his tenacity, unflagging effort and enthusiasm for the project and for getting this history of the Club into print.

Chapter 1

The Beginning of Tennis at Lomond Park

In 1905 **Robert S. Alexander**, 18 Lomond Road, together with eleven other local residents, bought Lomond Park and sold it to The Lomond Park Company Limited "LPC" for £ 6,015. The key objectives of the company were to acquire the ground, retain the park for games and recreation, plant trees and shrubs, and to let any part of the land.

In 1907 Trinity Recreation Club Limited "TRC" was formed with its shares held by members of Trinity Bowling Club and Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club. The role of "TRC" was to lease the ground from The Lomond Park Company Ltd and to promote recreational activity in the park and to assist in the administration of the Clubs.


Sir Malcom Smith K.B.E., the first Chairman of "T.R.C" and a Director of The Lomond Park Company, together with **John Dewar J.P.** who was also a director in both companies were the main promoters of the tennis Club.

Prior to World War 1, grass tennis courts could be seen in the larger house gardens in the Trinity area. In 1907, Trinity Bowling Club submitted a plan to The Lomond Park Company to lease a portion of Lomond Park to build a sports pavilion, Bowling Green and Tennis Courts. Later that year, Trinity Recreation Club Ltd agreed a twenty-one-year lease with "The Lomond Park Company Ltd" to develop the plan at an annual rent of £45. The area occupied by courts 1,2 & 3, previously formed a duck pond.

Trinity Bowling Club opened in 1855 and is the second oldest bowling club in Edinburgh, with their bowling green originally located on the west side of York Road, but this could only accommodate three rinks. The bowling club relocated from York Road to Lomond Park in 1909.

The name 'Lomond Park' may be derived from the name of a ship built and registered at Leith. All the land earlier formed part of Trinity Mains which had been bought by the "Fraternity of Masters and Mariners of Trinity House in 1713, hence the origin of the name "Trinity".

"On Saturday, the tennis courts and pavilion erected at Lomond Park by Trinity Recreation Club Limited were formerly opened by Chairman Sir Malcolm Smith. There had been a large number of applications and the list is already closed. Adjacent to the courts is a bowling green, and the membership of that also is almost full. The courts are laid with a composition of sand, tar and sawdust laid on a bed of ashes, giving a fine surface and it is intended to flood the courts in winter for curling purposes."

Lomond Park Tennis and Trinity Bowling Clubhouse

The Original Plans for the Tennis and Bowling Clubhouse and Grounds were designed by a Scottish Architect, **A. Hunter Crawford**. Born in Leith, **Hunter** was the son of **William Crawford**, the owner of the well-known business of William Crawford & Son Ltd, (Crawford's Biscuits), and at its peak claimed to be the largest biscuit manufacturer in Britain with factories in Leith and Liverpool and famous for the production of "Custard Creams".

Hunter was responsible for designing many U.K. biscuit factories and locally, six villas in Primrose Bank Road opposite Wardie Parish Church.

In 1931, he retired from architecture, and moved to London to run the family biscuit business.




A. Hunter Crawford - Architect drawing of Clubhouse

Chapter 2

The Foundation of Lawn Tennis

The All-England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club

The oldest "Real Tennis" court in the world can be found at Falkland Palace, Fife, built in 1539 by **King James V**. The early courts were shaped like an hourglass, distinct from the familiar rectangular court, with the net dipping sharply from 4 ft 6 inches at the post to 4 ft at mid court.

Major W.C. Wingfield was the founder of lawn tennis through the development of his game "sphairistike". The game was termed "lawn tennis" in 1877 when the "All England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club" was formed and the first Wimbledon Championships held. The upper classes influenced tennis in the early years. The first Wimbledon Championships ended on a Friday so that affluent spectators could watch the Eton and Harrow cricket match at Lords cricket ground on the Saturday. The lower classes were introduced to tennis at the end of the 19th century as the sport was introduced into the State school education system.

East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association Formed in 1905

The first tennis clubs in the East of Scotland were formed in the 1880s. The Edinburgh Lawn Tennis Company provided primitive indoor "facilities" housed in a hall known as the "Tin Temple," located at the east end of the Grange cricket ground in Stockbridge, Edinburgh comprising two indoor courts, dressing rooms and a small viewing gallery.

The Scottish Lawn Tennis Association was formed in 1895, and later the East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association in 1905, included clubs from the Counties of Stirling, Linlithgow, Edinburgh, and Scottish Borders.

The original sixteen clubs forming the East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association are listed below. (Today 10* of these clubs can claim East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association membership in its centenary year)

Early tennis clubs, Bonnington (1880), Lochend (1880) and Craighall, merged to form Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1903. Other tennis clubs, such as Dalkeith (1888), existed, but chose not to join the Association.

The original Edinburgh tennis clubs were established in the more spacious urban areas, in stark contrast to Edinburgh's "Old Town." In the years to follow, tennis developed rapidly as people became increasingly cash and time rich compared to earlier generations. Indeed, today one can reflect on the number of sports clubs able to celebrate their centenaries at this time.

Chapter 3

The Early Years 1907-1930

On Court

The period 1907-30 were the "Golden years" in the Club's history, player strength benefitting from the 1921 Trinity Tennis Club merger with players regularly competing in the latter stages of the Scottish Championships.

Kathleen Little was arguably one of the finest players to represent Lomond Park. She was a finalist in the Scottish Ladies Singles Championship in 1919 & 1924, a Ladies Doubles semi-finalist in 1913, 1919, 1923 & 1925, and Mixed Doubles semi-finalist in 1922 & 1925.

Kathleen was regularly selected for the East County Ladies team, and a member of the 1924 team that reached the British County Championship finals where all her team-mates were Scottish Internationalists. **Kathleen** was also a member of Liberton Tennis Club, considered the strongest club team in Scotland, and a member of their Scottish Cup winning side for 5 years from 1924-28. **Kathleen** won the Liberton Ladies Singles Championship, no mean achievement given the calibre of club-mates, **Mrs. Robin Welsh and Miss M.M. Fergus**.

Reginald (Reg) Butcher, an outstanding player, represented the East County and partnering club-mate **Alex F. Currie**, reached the 1919 Scottish Men's Doubles Championships semi-final and the Mixed Doubles semi-final in 1921, 1923 & 1926.

Reg partnered **Mrs. Hugh Wilson** (Liberton) to win the 1923 East of Scotland Open Mixed Doubles Championship and partnering **Mrs. Robin Welsh**, won the 1926 East Mixed Doubles Championship.

Reg and partner A.W. Banks (Murrayfield) won the 1932 Scottish Men's Doubles Veteran's title. Later Reg won the Inverleith Tennis Club Men's Singles Title 1929-33.


Reg won 21 caps for Scotland at Badminton, winning the Scottish Badminton Men's Doubles Title on 4 occasions in 1924, 1926, 1934 & 1935, adding the Mixed Doubles Title in 1922 & 1926.

Alex F. Currie reached the 1919 Scottish Men's Doubles semi-final partnering **Reg Butcher**, and partnering club-mate **James McDonald** competed in the 1925 Scottish Veteran Men's Doubles Championship final. **Alex** played for the East County Men's team, a side he captained in 1930.

Notable Club successes:

- o **Dr H.S. Davidson** 1914 East of Scotland Gents Singles H'cap
- A.K Allan lost to J.S. Pringle in 1923 Scottish Boy's Singles semi-final
- o **A.T Lamb** partnering **J. Robertson** (Singapore) reached the 1930 Scottish Veteran Men's Doubles Championship final

Other Lomond Park players competing in the Scottish Championships played at Powderhall, Ravelston and Murrayfield Stadium were E.E. Little, M.B. Allan, E. Allan, E.R. Allan, J.G. Galloway, C.H. Bucher, A.C. Ross, J. Waugh, D.C. Osbourne, R. Shearer, H.J. Newlands, C.R.O Morrison & J.G. Macauley.

Butcher, Duncan and Fergus all featured in winning Scottish Titles in the 1920s & 1930s. **Miss Duncan & Fergus** were members of the all-conquering Liberton Ladies' team, together with **Kathleen Little**.

Club Championships

David S. Crawford won the first recorded Men's Singles Championship in 1909 and again in 1910. In 1912 whilst Club President, he presented the current Men's Championship Cup to the Club. **Dr A.S Walker** was Singles Champion in 1911 & 1913 and later **Reg Butcher** won the Men's Singles title seven times between 1919-27 with a run of five consecutive title successes 1923-27. **Alex F. Currie & Sydney Herald** won five Men's Doubles titles 1923-29.

In 1921, the Lomond Park Men's 1 & 11 teams presented to the Ladies a Singles Championship Trophy, which is still played for today. The impressive **Kathleen Little** won 6 Women's Singles titles 1921-29, including a run of 4 titles wins 1921 –1924.

In Ladies' Doubles, **Kathleen Little** & her sister **Eleanor Little**, won back-to-back Championships in 1924-25. **E. Bessie Allan** and **A.C. Ross** started their impressive 11 consecutive year run of title wins.

In Mixed Doubles, **Reg** and wife **Helen Butcher** had four championship successes 1923-26, and **Reg** partnered **Miss Christine H. Bucher** to a further championship in 1927. **Kathleen Little,** partnering **Alex F. Currie,** won three Mixed Doubles Titles 1922-29.

The standard of Club Championship play in this era was high, with **Reg Butcher**, **Alex Currie**, **A.W. Davidson**, **James McDonald**, **Alex Allan**, **Kathleen Little and E. Bessie Allan** either representing the East County teams or reaching the semi-final or final of the Scottish Championships.

East of Scotland Leagues

Lomond Park Men played in Division 2 of the East leagues from 1911. The Trinity Club played in Division 1 prior to 1921. Following the Trinity club merger, Lomond Park played in Division 1, retaining their position in the top league until 1929. Two Men's teams were entered in the leagues in 1921 and for three years from 1922-25 three teams were entered. The second team won Division 2 in 1922-23. In 1922, Ladies League matches were introduced, with Lomond Park playing in Division 1 for 3 years from 1923.

Off Court Administration

Dr. George F. Kerr was the first Honorary Club President (1907-09). A founding member of Dyvours Lawn Tennis Club in 1883 and later the Scottish Lawn Tennis Association in 1895, **George** played in the 1885 Wimbledon Men's Singles Championships. In 1887 he reached the semifinal in both the East and West of Scotland Singles Championships and a Scottish Men's Singles Championship Quarter finalist in 1886, 1888 & 1893. In 1889, **Dr. Kerr** was elected the Scottish representative to the Lawn Tennis Association Council.


David S. Crawford, former Craighall Tennis Club Singles Champion joined Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1904. David was Lomond Park Men's Singles Champion 1909-10 and exceptionally served the Club for a 16-year period as Honorary President from 1910-25 and was invited to become an Honorary Life Member in 1926. David was a member of the extended "Crawford" biscuit family and he established D.S. Crawford Ltd in 1899, a Leith bakery with a chain of 200 shops and restaurants, the most famous of which was the elegant Crawford Tearooms, Princes Street, Edinburgh. The firm earned a fine reputation and Royal Warrant through the provision of catering over a number of years to the Annual Royal Summer Garden Party at Holyrood House.

As an indicator of their position in society, the early Lomond Park Club promoters, **Dr George Kerr**, **John Dewar J.P.** and **David S. Crawford** were all invited guests to the 1924 Royal Highland Society Gathering at Braemar. (Reported in the Aberdeen Press & Journal)

Alex F. Currie, former Trinity Lawn Tennis Club Singles Champion, was elected East of Scotland President 1925-26, S.L.T.A representative 1920 & 1926, serving as Honorary Club President for 5 years 1930-34.

In 1928, **H. Hamilton Beattie**, past Singles Champion of Bonnington & Trinity Lawn Tennis clubs, Lomond Park Honorary President 1926-28, in failing health resigned as Club President and was invited to become an Honorary Life Member.

James McDonald, also a past Trinity Tennis Club Singles Champion served as Honorary Club Secretary for five years 1925-29.

The leather-bound Cash book of 1915-37 with gold lettering on the binding "Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club" and copperplate descriptive handwritten entries with printed sequential folio reference numbers.

The early minute books are meticulous. Committee meetings occurred more frequently than is the case today. The minute books prior to 1925 have not been seen. Printed Cards were mailed to advise members of team selection.

The Club records in the early years reflect the formality of the time. An advertising leaflet by Trinity Recreation Club Limited publicising a two-day fund-raising Bazaar at a hall in Ferry Road in 1908, records the full names of the Club Patrons and Committee.

CAPTAIN, 16th ROYAL SCOTS

Born in Broughty Ferry to salvage engineer **Thomas Napier Armit** and **Mary Ann Armit, Armit** was educated at George Watson's College in Edinburgh. After Watson's College, **Armit** studied law at Edinburgh University and was admitted to the Faculty of Advocates in March 1904.

Following the outbreak of war, he joined the 16th ("McCrae's") Battalion, Royal Scots in December 1914. The battalion had been formed in November by Lt-Col George McCrae. Initially a Private, within a month Armit was a Second Lieutenant and by the time of his death he had been promoted to Captain. He was the editor of a battalion newspaper called "The Weakly Rumour". McCrae's Battalion trained in Ripon from 29 May 1915. McCrae's had a fair smattering of lawyers; seven solicitors in the ranks, and eight with legal occupations among the officers, Armit and Alexander Brown being the only Advocates.

However, before he embarked for France, **Armit** returned to Edinburgh for a most important event. At the age of 35, he married 29-year-old **Jennie Mackie**, whose father was the ship owner, **Sir Richard Mackie**. The wedding took place at the Mackie house in Trinity Grove, off Trinity Road.

After a brief honeymoon, he returned to Ripon and on 8 January 1916 sailed from Southampton to Le Havre. The travails of **McCrae's** Battalion are well documented in Jack 10, **Alexander's** excellent book, but the Battalion's most bloody encounter of the war was to be at the Battle of the Somme. **Armit** was in command of a Company of the Battalion on the first day of the Battle on 1st July 1916, and succeeded in capturing the fourth line of the German trenches, thus achieving the objective set. The next day he won his Military Cross leading a bombing attack at Scots Redoubt.

The Somme Battle rumbled on despite the horrific losses on the first day, but on 4th August 1916 **Armit** was killed in action while leading "B" Company on an attack on a German position with the mundane name of Intermediate Trench, just north of Bazentin-le-petit. To quote from **Alexander's** book, "At 04.51 the whistles blew. Both companies climbed over the parapet and advanced 30 paces. At that point the machine guns opened fire. **Armit** was on the left, leading his bombers. He got as far as the German wire, where he was shot through the head." Only one member of the company reached the objective.

Sir George McCrae selected two companies to attack Intermediate Trench; one was B Company under **Captain Armit**. To quote the official history of the Royal Scots – "unfortunately the plan miscarried. The Royal Scots lost their way in the darkness and had to attack by daylight under the direct observation of the enemy machine gunners. The only officer to reach the trench was **Lt. Mackenzie**, who was promptly shot dead when he gained the objective." What had been a hard task became an impossible task when attempted in daylight.

Armit's name is remembered on the Thiepval Memorial on the Somme.

Trinity Lawn Tennis Club History

Trinity Lawn Tennis Club was formed in 1903 following the demise of Bonnington (Raimes Park / renamed Victoria Park), Lochend (Hawkhill) and then the affluent Craighall Lawn Tennis Club. The Bonnington & Lochend Clubs had existed since 1880.

The well-known Ramage shipping family, and J. Inglis, the shipbuilder, were all leading Craighall members, and the Club's best players included David S. Crawford and A. W. Banks. The Club was famous for the fact that the tennis balls were only used for one set. It was reported but not confirmed that the defunct Craighall Tennis Club used up considerable closing reserves to hold a number of member's dances and dinners.

Ten Bonnington members, including **James Pourie**, **H. Hamilton Beattie**, **James Bruce**, and **J.G. Galloway**, each subscribed \pounds 5, and the Craighall courts and other assets were purchased for \pounds 50 to form Trinity Lawn Tennis Club. The Trinity Club started with full membership on three hard courts located at 18 Craighall Gardens, Trinity.

The first Trinity Tennis Club Men's Club Championships were held in 1904, with the former Bonnington Club champion **James Pourie** defeating a former Craighall champion **David S. Crawford. Pourie** completed the hat-trick of Singles victories in 1905 and in 1907. **H. Hamilton Beattie** won the Men's Singles Championship on six occasions in 1906, 1908-09, 1912, 1914, and 1919. **James MacDonald** won the Singles Title in 1910 and 1913, and **Alex F. Currie** in 1911. The last Trinity Club Champion in 1920 was **W. A. Davidson**, later to became the Waverley Club Captain.

In Ladies Singles, **Mrs. J.G Galloway** recorded three championship victories 1907–1910 and **Mrs. Harry Perry** two Titles in 1911-14.

The Trinity Club was strong in East League tennis, with the Men's 1st team competing in Division 1 and the 2nd team in Division 2. The best 1st team performance was in 1919, when they tied with a strong University team at the top of the 1st Division and lost by the odd match. The second team won the 2nd Division in 1911 & 1920.

Lomond Park Club merger with Trinity Tennis Club 1921

A key development in the history of Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club was the amalgamation with Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1921. The Trinity Club was required to vacate their courts by the Education Authority who owned the grounds, and intended to use the courts solely for Trinity Academy pupils. The Lomond Park Club had access to the land to expand its facilities but lacked the financial resources to develop the opportunity.

The Trinity Club was extremely wealthy and transferred its reserves, £561-5/11 d to the Lomond Park Club. This was a considerable sum of money in those days especially bearing in mind the relatively modest financial position of the Lomond Park Club. The combined Club had an enviable playing strength, and the improved financial position of the combined resources allowed the Lomond Park Club to convert the three lower senior courts from tar macadam and grey ash to red blaes around 1922 and to lay new courts four and five on the upper level.

In the period following the Club amalgamation, maintenance of the five blaes and two grass courts was a demanding task with limited equipment. **James Skea**, employed 1922-1926, was described as "such an efficient and faithful servant" and his weekly wage £ 3- 5/-. d. **Mr. Skea** announced his emigration to Australia, and highly regarded, a testimonial silver collection raised £12 10 /- d in treasury notes and he was presented with a clock. **Mr. Skea's** successor **Adam L. Thomson** was likewise highly regarded. In 1927 lead court lines were introduced replacing lime painted lines on the red blaes surface to reduce cost.

In 1924, Club membership was healthy and restricted to 160, and following the Trinity club merger a waiting list was introduced.

With it's improved financial position, the Club invested in the clubhouse facility with an extension and a new ladies' room which greatly improved the accommodation and needs of the increased membership. These various extensions explain the irregular shape at the back of the clubhouse. In 1928, a further Pavilion extension (believed to be the kitchen and tearoom area) was completed at a cost of £ 150.

As an indication of the modest Lomond Park financial position in the early years, the bank balance in 1915 was £ 41 -9 / 9d, Senior subscriptions a guinea (£1-1-0 d), members paid 5 /- d to the tea fund and 5 /0 d. to the ball fund with Juniors paying 16 /-. d, Sports Retailer "Thorntons" supplied new tennis balls for £ 4 -2 /6 d for 6 dozen.

Lomond Park Company charged annual rent of £ 4- 4/- d for two grass courts at the Zetland Place / Stirling Road corner of the park between 1923-1935, used by Junior members. St Serfs School rented the grass courts which helped defray cost. Grass court use had not been without complaint and claims of "annoyance to putting course users from stray tennis balls" led to a suggestion that higher netting was required. An increase in rent to £ 6-5/- d in 1935 brought an end to grass court play on economic grounds.

Lady Members' Tea Duties (Byelaw 12)

Club byelaws were published in 1928 and rule 12 may raise a few equality issues in today's terms: "Tea is provided for members on Saturday afternoons and for the teams on home match days. The tea is prepared and dispensed by the Lady members, and it is an obligation on the part of every Lady member to take her share in this work". This was further amended in 1936 and some may argue worsened the position as "Any Lady member who does not wish to take a Tea Day as required in the rules (Byelaw 12) must remit 5/- extra to the treasurer along with her subscription".

Lomond Park Club Colours (1928)

The Club Blazer is White and Navy Blue colour with a binding of blue, yellow and white, and club initials on the pocket in blue and yellow.

Chapter 4

The War Years 1931-1945

On Court

Today, Lomond Park remains a family club. During the War years, family involvement was strongly exemplified by the **Allan family (Alex K. Allan** and sisters **E. Bessie Allan** and **Maimie H. K. Allan** with **Christine M. Allan**, the daughter of **Alex**). The **Allan** family were a strong influence on Club playing standards, and as Club administrators over many years.

During this period, the Club was strongly represented in the East of Scotland Championships, held at Merchiston and Westhall. The men were represented by A.J. Cook, W.F.G (Bill) Lord, Alex K. Allan, W. D. McNaughton, P. P. Jackson, H. L. Roxburgh, C. F. Robertson, D. Craigie Pringle, George S. P. Bain & A. Ernest Bromfield, and the ladies represented by Miss Maimie H K. Allan. Miss C. Wright, Mrs R. Kenyon Letts, Miss E. L. Thomson & Miss A. C. Ross.

Of note in the East of Scotland Men's Singles Championships, H. L Roxburgh reached the third round in 1932 and in 1938 A. Ernest Bromfield reached the third round.

In 1938, **D. Craigie Pringle** lost in the semi-final of the East of Scotland Men's Singles to the Midland champion **D.M. Duncan** (Kinnoull) with the match reported to have finished just before 11 pm in a time before floodlights were used.

Alex F. Currie, Alex K. Allan and Sydney W. B. Herald and Miss E.L. Thomson all represented the East of Scotland County Teams.

Club Championships

In Men's Singles, no one player dominated this period. Alex F. Currie recorded wins in 1930-31 and C.F. Robertson recorded a hat-trick of victories in 1933, 1934 & 1937.

In Men's Doubles, **M. S Stewart** recorded wins in 1930 & 1931, and **C.R.P. Guttridge** recorded Championship wins in 1938 & 1939.

Miss E. Bessie Allan demonstrated her domination by winning ten Ladies Singles Championship Titles 1925 – 37 including a run of five successive titles 1930-34. During the 31 years from 1925-55, **Bessie** and her sister **Maimie** won 21 Ladies Singles Titles between them, with the intervention of World War 2 accounting for a further 6 years when no Club Championships were played.

In Ladies Doubles, **E. Bessie Allan** won 13 Championship titles during the period 1926-39, and in a great demonstration of consistency partnering **Miss A C Ross** on 11 consecutive years 1926-36. The **Allan sisters, Bessie** and **Maimie,** recorded 24 Ladies Doubles Championship wins in the 31-year period 1926-56, including an enforced break of 6 years for the second World War, the only year when they did not win the title was in 1952.

In Mixed Doubles, **Maimie K.H. Allan** recorded six championship wins in a period spanning 25 years 1930-54, on three occasions partnering **Alex K. Allan** and twice partnering **W.F.G. (Bill) Lord**.

Alex K. Allan recorded 6 Mixed Doubles wins in a 22-year period 1930-51, three times partnering **Maimie Allan**, and **Bessie Allan** once.

Bessie Allan recorded a hat-trick of Mixed Doubles Titles in 1934-39, partnering **F.D.M. Williams** on two occasions.

East of Scotland Leagues

The Men's I team returned to Division 1 in 1933, with the second team slipping to Division 4. The Ladies team gained first Division status in 1938.

By 1933, the Club membership was full. The Club had a junior section which enjoyed the use of grass and hard courts, and this section formed the most valuable recruiting ground for the Club. Reported in the local Press "that few Edinburgh clubs had such a young team, giving great hope for the future, that their place in the first Division would be retained".

In 1939, the Lomond Ladies won a 1st Division match 6-1 at Colinton (Westgarth Road) represented by Miss E.L. Thomson, Miss Maimie H.K. Allan, Mrs. A.J. Lindsay, Mrs. D. Currie, Miss Airey, Miss E. Bessie Allan. The Ladies team demonstrated their competitive nature and wrote to the ESLTA complaining that the Kirkcaldy opposition had not provided the required Slazenger match balls.

Administration

James McDonald, who had served as Honorary Secretary for 5 years (1925-29), a Lomond Park and Trinity Club Men's Singles Champion, and Finalist in the 1925 Scottish Veterans Men's Doubles Championship, was appointed an Honorary Life Member in 1932.

Alex F. Currie who had done so much for the Club and Scottish Tennis both on and off court, Served S.L.T.A 1920 & 1926, East of Scotland Honorary President 1925-26, Honorary Club President 1930-34, Scottish Men's Doubles semi-finalist 1919, Scottish Veterans Men's Doubles Championship finalist 1925, East County Captain 1930, and eleven-times Club Champion in singles and doubles, was invited to become an Honorary Life Member in 1946.



G.S.P.Bain

George S.P Bain won the Club singles and doubles championships in 1936 & 1938, and with the intervention of WW2 trained to be an R.A.F. Spitfire pilot. In 1941 he survived a mid-air collision.

In 1937 his wife **Jean**, presented the current Mixed Doubles Championship Trophy to the Club.

At the conclusion of war, **George**, then a member of the (S.L.T.A) Scottish Lawn Tennis Association as Honorary Secretary

Treasurer for 11 years (1949-60), Honorary Vice President 1949, also serving as S.L.T.A representative on the Council of the L.T.A (1950-59).

The Second World War Years

For the Club to survive the War years required a tremendous commitment. **A. J. Lindsay** served on the Club committee for a record 20 years from 1931–50, Honorary Secretary for 16 years from 1931-46, doubling as Honorary Treasurer 1940-46 for 7 years, Honorary Club President in 1949-50. He was invited to become an Honorary Life member in 1952 and presented with a gold wristwatch.

Alex K. Allan served as Honorary President for 8 years 1940-47 and Club Treasurer for 9 years 1929- 37.

During the war, membership fell with only three courts used. The Club was saddened to receive news of the death of our grounds-man **Adam L. Thomson**, who had served the Club loyally for 15 seasons from 1926-41.

The Club minutes during the war years, indicated the hardship experienced, examples of which are "The wearing of Whites' during play will not be considered necessary however tennis shoes must be worn." and "Whiting paint introduced to mark the lines. (Lead lines used for the war effort)."

With falling income, the Club struggled financially, receiving £30 from Granton Naval Base, Heriots Tennis Club and the "WRNS" for court use. To remain solvent the Club was forced to sell its last investment £150 x "3% War Stock".


Trinity Bowling Club noted in 1944, that sheep were straying onto the bowling green via the tennis courts. Under Wartime regulations the Admiralty controlled Lomond Park and they let the ground for grazing.

By 1945, only 15 members remained, and the Club's survival must have been in doubt, however a £75 Trinity Recreation Club Limited loan saved the Club from insolvency.

The Tragedy of World War 2

Tragically, several members were killed on active service in WW2.

Duncan M. Moodie was the pilot of a Lancaster 111 JB220 and died in 1943, aged 27, on a night mission over Hanover, Germany. He was awarded the D.F.C. (Distinguished Flying Cross) posthumously and is buried in Becklingen War Cemetery.

Chapter 5

The Recovery 1946-1970

Post War Recovery Off Court

With the end of conflict, the Club set about recovery and 'Esprit de corps' essential. The clubhouse had suffered neglect and was restored to previous glory with the purchase of new chairs. The Grounds-man's weekly wage in 1947 was £ 4- 4/7 d compared to an adult annual subscription of £ 3 3/- d, Subscription Revenue was restored to a £400 level with 100 + members.

By 1948, the Club was back in surplus, a Garden Fete raised £167, a Bridge Drive organized by **A.J. Lindsay** raised £ 26 12/- d, and the Loan from Trinity Recreation Club Limited that had thrown the Club a lifeline from insolvency was fully repaid. AGM Postcards were printed.

By 1949, membership levels had improved with 135 senior members and 65 juniors. Social normality returned, with dances at the Wardie Masonic Hall and Grosvenor Hotel, organized by **Tom Burns** (far right), attended by 136 people, ticket price 15 /-. d.

On Court

In 1949, Lomond Park at home lost narrowly to Edinburgh University in the Men's Scottish Cup East of Scotland Regional Final by 7 sets to 6.

Miss D. I. Robinson narrowly lost the 1949 Nairn Ladies Singles Title to Miss M Walker (Four Courts Aberdeen) in a hard fought 6-0, 4-6, 14-12.

Craigie Pringle lost the 1946 East Men's Singles Championship final but won the 1950 & 1952 Grantown-on-Spey Men's Singles Trophy.

Ken More, J. M Reid and Miss D. I. Robinson all played in the East of Scotland Championships in the 1950s. **J. M. Reid** reached the Men's Singles fourth round in 1950, and **Miss D. I. Robinson** reached the Ladies Singles third round in the same year.

Alex Allan partnered **Victor Woodhawks** (Murrayfield) to win the Scottish Veterans Doubles Championship in 1952.

Douglas & Irene Seale won the Corstorphine Open Mixed Doubles Championship in 1957 & 1960.



Bill Lord, an umpire at the East Junior Championships, met Dorothy McNeill (Sharp), and encouraged her to join Lomond Park to develop her tennis. Dorothy won the East Girls Singles Championship in 1958-60 & East Girls Doubles Title in 1957 & 1960. Dorothy then joined Waverley Tennis club, where she won the East Ladies Singles Title in 1965 & 1974, the 1965 East Ladies Doubles Title partnering Miss S. M. Reid, and in 1968 partnering Miss N.T. Buchanan. She also won the

East Mixed Doubles Championship partnering **R. G. Shearer** in 1975. **Dorothy** is also better known as a Squash Rackets Internationalist.

Club Championships

The strength of individual players is once more evident during this period; **A. E. (Ernest) Bromfield** recorded four Men's Singles Championship successes in 1939 and a hat-trick of wins in 1950-52. **Ernest** was also a Squash Rackets Internationalist and one of Scotland's leading skaters.

Craigie Pringle recorded three singles triumphs in 1938, 1947 and 1948. Back-to-Back Singles Titles were recorded by G.K (Ken) More 1956-57, Ian McKenzie 1959-60, Ronald Scobie 1962-63, Bob Searle 1964-65 and Stan Fullerton 1966-67.

From 1957, the Men's Singles Championships were reduced from the best of five sets to three sets.

Maimie Allan won 11 Ladies Singles Championships 1938 –53 spanning 15 years, Margo Horne recorded 3 straight Championship wins 1958-60 and Dorothy McNeill recording victory in 1957. Christine Allan recorded three Ladies Singles Championship victories in 1963, 1964 & 1966.

In Men's Doubles, Alex Allan and Craigie Pringle won back-to-back titles in 1947-48, Ernest Bromfield recorded three victories in four years including back-to-back titles in 1949-50 partnering J.M. Reid. Ken More demonstrated complete flexibility and won 7 straight titles with various partners 1951-57, Bob Searle recorded five championship wins 1956–63, including three victories partnering Ian Forbes. Ian McKenzie partnering Willie Reid recording back-to-back Titles in 1959-60. Later, Douglas Seale with various partners won four Men's Doubles titles 1964-70.

In Ladies Doubles, **Maimie Allan** celebrated 11 Championship Titles 1938-56 spanning World War Two with various partners including **Irene Seale** (4), **D.I. Robinson** (3) & **M.A.I. Lesslie** (3). **Irene Seale** recorded seven Ladies Doubles Titles in 1953-68 and **Margo Horne** partnering **E.R. Brown** celebrated four championship titles in five years 1957-61.

In Mixed Doubles, **Bill Lord** enjoyed a hat-trick of Mixed Doubles Championship wins in 1946, 1954 & partnering **Dorothy McNeill** in 1957. Husband and wife team, **Douglas** and **Irene Seale** secured five Championship Titles 1963-70.

East of Scotland Leagues

In 1951, the Ladies team travelled to Kirkcaldy, a journey presumably made by train or ferry, before the construction of the Forth Road Bridge in 1964.

Men's tennis enjoyed a period of strength from 1956 to the early 1960s, the 1st team gained East Division 1 league status with Ken Scobie, Ian McKenzie, Bob Searle, Willie Reed, Ken More, John Topping, Ron Hourston, Stewart Taylor, Dizzy Kidd, Ranald Stewart, Tom Whyte and Douglas Seale representing the Club.

In 1955 School & Clubmates Stewart Taylor & Kenneth Scobie were runners up in the East of Scotland Under 18 Boys Doubles Final and reached the semi-finals of the Scottish Boys Doubles Under 18. In 1956, Kenneth Scobie coached by the great Polish National Champion, Ignacy Tloczynski, partnering Jack Dryburgh won the East of Scotland Boys Doubles Under 18 Championship. Kenneth played East County tennis Under 21 for 4 years and left Lomond Park to develop his tennis career at the Westhall Club, Edinburgh.

Stewart Taylor, 1958 Singles Champion, remarkedly served right-handed and played all other strokes left-handed, smashing with both hands.

Ian McKenzie, 1959 & 1960 Club Champion in Singles and Doubles, joined Liberton to develop his tennis career. **Ian** was a member of the 1963 Liberton Scottish Cup winning team and represented the East of Scotland County team from 1958-72 and a member of GB Vets team.

Sanctity of the Sabbath

Society respected the Sanctity of the Sabbath in the post War period. The Club approached Trinity Recreation Club Limited in 1951 to secure Sunday play in the Clubs best long-term interests. Circulars were distributed supporting the Sunday Play debate cost 9 / 4 d and were described as "Expenses of Protest Circular". The Club informed "TRC" and "The Lomond Park Company" of their decision and "TRC" threatened to evict the tennis club if Sunday play continued. Sunday tennis was permitted from 1955 between the hours of 2 - 6 pm.

Social and Junior Tennis

In 1957, **Bob Searle** arranged a friendly 12 a side match against his old Club "Titwood from Glasgow" and by 1959, this popular event was described as a grand affair with high tea at the Marina Hotel followed by a dance at the Suffolk Hotel.

The Club's Junior section in the 1950's was successfully organized by **Dorothy McDonald** (daughter of **R.M. Pentland**, Club Honorary President 1937-39).

The Administrators

- O G.K. (Ken) More held the office of Club Treasurer 1950-54
- o **A.C. Wheeler** Match Secretary 1939-41, Honorary President 1951-52, East County Treasurer for 5 years 1950-55
- Craigie Pringle who had associations with Barnton Park officiated as a Wimbledon linesman in the 1950-60's, East of Scotland Honorary President 1957–58 and an elected S.L.T.A. member

Bill Lord was a natural leader, serving the Club as Honorary Treasurer 1938-39, Men's Captain in 1952, elected Honorary President in 1953-55 & then recalled to lead the Club again in difficult times in 1974-76. On court Bill was 5 times Club Doubles Champion in 1946-58.

Tom L. Burns served as Honorary Club President 1959-60, was recalled in 1972-73 for a second term in office during a difficult period for the Club.

The Sixties - A Period of Difficulty

Controversially in 1959, the treasurer resigned following an alleged shortage of f, 3, which upon investigation rose to f, 22.

At the 1960 AGM, the Club financial position was described as disastrous due to falling membership, a situation faced by a number of tennis clubs. Trinity Bowling Club were also facing financial challenges. To address the problem an invitation to join the Club was extended to National Commercial Bank staff and to employees of the nearby engineering firm "Bruce Peebles". One of the oldest tennis clubs in Edinburgh, the nearby Inverleith Club, formed in 1880, considered merging with Lomond Park in 1966, but finally amalgamated with the Dyvours Club in Stockbridge. With almost no bank reserves, the Lomond Park clubhouse suffered from vandalism.

Several members stepped up and without their efforts the Club would surely have folded. Most notably:



R. L. (Bob) Searle served as Honorary President for 6 years 1961-66 and chaired a most important meeting in 1962 when the Club future was discussed. **Bob** was an 8 times Club Champion in Singles and Doubles (1956-63), including a Mixed Doubles victory partnering his wife, **Nancy**.

Bob represented the Men's team playing in Division 1 and was heavily involved in the Club's Saturday morning Junior coaching.

Maintaining the **Searle** family tennis standards, **Bob and Nancy's** daughter **Jill** was a Ladies Singles and Doubles Champion (1968-71).

Despite the financial difficulties, discipline and formality are the order of the day and a rule is introduced in 1968 regarding the taking of tea on Saturday and Sundays: "a bell will be rung and all courts to be vacated for a period of 15 minutes during which tea will be served in the pavilion."

Further, the 1968 Club minutes note that "Ball boys" to be coached for Senior Finals Day (no mention of girls)!

Maintenance of the Red Blaes Court Surface



The red blaes court maintenance was a labour-intensive task, with daily court rolling, brushing, watering, line brushing, with the "Courts Reserved for Match" sign hung on the gate after preparation and before matches.

The use of the heavy cast iron roller would probably not be permitted for health and safety reasons in the 21st century.

Chapter 6

The Coming of Age 1971-2006

Survival of The Lomond Park Company Limited

1973 saw an imminent threat to the survival of The Lomond Park Company Ltd. The Scotsman Newspaper reported that a shareholder, **Mr. J Beatson**, considered the Park, "had been allowed to deteriorate under the present board and was losing money, I only want to see the park is put in good order or to have it sold to a builder who would undertake a suitable type of development."

The Lomond Park Company Chairman, Mr. H C Hendry sent a circular to all shareholders pointing out that the Company Constitution did not allow for Property Development and its continued use for recreational purposes would protect house prices in the immediate area by ensuring high amenity. The matter was laid to rest!

John Brindle writes: (The Seventies the Brink of the Abyss)

When I started playing East League tennis for Kirkcaldy in the nineteen fifties, Lomond Park was a name to be contended with: its Men's team having a particularly strong reputation. However, by the time I moved into Lomond Road in 1974 there had been a sad decline. I was encouraged to join Lomond Park by my next-door neighbour, **John Dale**, and soon discovered that much was expected of the seventy or so members.

The courts were red blaes and there was no play in the winter as soon as the first frost lifted the lines. When spring came, a huge effort was required to get the courts into condition for the season. This was usually frustrated by the weather because the top surface was very unstable in the wet. A five-ton lorry load of new top dressing would appear and twenty sacks of new blaes were scattered on each court and then they had to be brushed and rolled to get an even playing surface. Then the fun began as the lines had to be re-laid requiring an exercise in Pythagorean geometry. Each line then had to be nailed with bucketful's of nails, much to the amusement of the old ladies in Viewpoint, and of course those who engaged in this task were for the rest of the season accused of not putting the nails down straight!

The committee led by **Bill Lord** began to address the problem of the declining membership. At the time squash was in the ascendant and the first proposal was to add two squash courts at the back of the ladies changing room. With the invaluable benefit of hindsight, it was perhaps fortunate that this was rejected by the membership. The problem remained and the condition of the courts and the fencing was causing concern. The top two courts, invariably referred to as the Junior courts, had a poor surface with clinker coming up through them, not a promising surface for aspiring new players. The challenge was how to fund the £46,500 required to replace all the courts.

A crisis meeting was held in 1980 when various options were put to the members, one of which was for the Club to go out of existence as well as various permutations of relaying the courts in stages. The meeting agreed that the only solution was to go for broke. The problem then was how to get there. There were several positives. Despite the costs of having a grounds-man to brush and roll the courts, finances were prudently managed, latterly by **Cynthia Bull**. The Scottish Sports Council and Edinburgh Corporation were approached and grants of £,12,000 and £,6,000 respectively were offered.

The social life of the club revolved around fund-raising efforts. The annual coffee morning in May had been essential for years to balance the books and it took on a new importance. Horse race nights were organised using a course marked out on the courts with dice for the riders' moves and even a water jump much loved by **Donald Allan**. There was still a formidable funding gap, but the members had agreed to a levy of one year's subscription and **Roger Miller** offered a generous loan with smaller loans from the committee to make up the balance. Trinity Recreation Club was extremely supportive and signed the contract as the contractor wanted to deal with an incorporated body. **Captain Forbes, Stanley Gray & Peter Whyte** all played a very positive role.

The investment in the club was well worth it and the new courts were inaugurated with an invitation tournament to all the Edinburgh clubs in August 1982. Provision was made for floodlighting in 1983 and soon the benefits were apparent in an all-the-year-round playing season and much better facilities for Juniors. The Saturday morning Nippers who began to play then are now the old men of the First team! There was a boom in membership, which reached nearly 550 in 1994, and the combination of increased membership and savings on maintenance transformed the club's finances.

Squash Rackets and All-Weather Court Project 1978

The sub-committee considering the "Squash rackets" and "Tennis" projects was led by **Michael Pentland**, the Tennis Club President and a former University "Squash Blue", **Cynthia Bull** (Treasurer), **Anne Miller, Tony Hart** (Technical Coordinator), and **Ronnie Sloan** (Finance Coordinator).

The sub-committee worked tirelessly on the project but following a lower-than-expected expression of interest by tennis Club members, it was decided that the "Squash project" was not sufficiently viable, and the Investment in "All-weather courts" had been investigated and approved.

The decision to lay Synthetic Elastosol All Weather Courts, the adversity in which the Club found itself, had the effect of galvanizing the membership, playing standards improved and most importantly the Fund raising, and social events brought the club membership together.



Cynthia M.S. Bull - Club Treasurer

Cynthia Bull served as Treasurer for nine years 1972-80 during the funding of the first all-weather courts.

An adventurous Finance Package was tailored to meet the Cost of Resurfacing all five courts £, 46,500:

There was a double subscription levied in 1982 and £ 6,750 was raised from members who subscribed for Repayable Bonds of £ 25 each. The Club received a generous £ 6,000 Interest Free Loan from a local resident, Roger Miller.

Charles Lawrence Ltd laid the courts in the Spring of 1982 and 18 Mixed Couples representing East of Scotland clubs were invited to an Opening Tournament in August 1982, won by Blackhall Tennis club. In 1983 Floodlights were installed on Courts 1 & 2 at a cost of £ 4,000.

1982 Court Replacement Groundworks

A Social Committee, led by **Joyce Campbell** was appointed, and during the next few years many people would be involved in the organisation of fund raising and social events to finance the loan repayments. The Fund-Raising effort was nothing short of incredible with members helping in any way they could.

The Coffee Morning held in May each year became an important fund raiser for the Club and regularly raised over \pounds 500, a feature being the beat the goalie challenge (**Gordon Chalmers**), A Filmed Derby Race night was held in St Serfs Scout Hall, A sponsored cycle to Gullane raised £270, in appalling weather conditions for the return leg, with driving rain from the west. A stop at Luca's Ice Cream shop in Musselburgh allowed a gathering of energy for the last 8 miles home. Other events included a Car treasure hunt, a Progressive meal and Children's sponsored walk.

Not of course forgetting the Jumble Sale at Portobello Town Hall which raised £195, when the enthusiastic **David Fairbairn** took off his jersey, and another stall holder sold it by mistake!



Michael D. Pentland: Honorary Life Membership 2005

Michael led the Club through a most challenging period, presiding over the clubs' transformation with the decision to invest in "All Weather Courts" and managing the f 46,500 funding package to support the plan. Under **Michael's** extended five-year Presidency, the Club had moved from a perilous state to a thriving organization with a solid financial base.

The Club Fund raising effort led by **Joyce Campbell** was outstanding, the speed at which the Club paid off its debts must have surprised even **Michael Pentland**. The £ 6,000 Loan from **Roger Miller** was fully repaid in 1985, the £ 5,000 LTA Loan repaid in 1986 and the £ 6,750 Members Bonds repaid by a ballot system with the final amount repaid in 1987.

Michael served as Honorary Club Auditor for 25 years. To mark his retiral from office and in recognition of his long association with the Club, **Michael** presented to the Club a Girls Under 18 Singles Championship Trophy, which is still played for today.

Court Resurfacing - Grass Carpet 1991 and Practice Wall

The 1982 Elastosol Rubber crumb surface, was replaced in 1991 with a Desso Sportilan 21 mm Artificial Grass carpet. The court was laid by E.R.D.C. Ltd at a cost of £ 49,575. This proved a good investment with the carpet performing well over the next 11 years. The Club's financial position was now much stronger, the project funded by £20,000 from reserves, an £ 18,000 6-year LTA Loan guaranteed by 20 club members, repaid within a year (much to the relief of guarantors), and a £ 12,000 Grant from "The Foundation of Sports & the Arts".



The new courts coincided with the building of a tennis practice wall costing f, 2,370, part funded by a f,500 Scottish Sports Council Grant. To protect the park surface, sections of park perimeter railing in Lomond Road were removed to allow the heavy Concrete Mixer Vehicle access.

Court Replacement Artificial Grass Court Surface (2002)

In 2002, the courts were replaced with a shorter 15 mm pile carpet laid by Charles Lawrence Surfaces Limited at a cost of £, 49,000, funded from accumulated reserves. The Court surface which had initially played well, soon became extremely dangerous. The carpet fibres were bending, the sand lying on top of the fibres, creating a treacherous surface. A 12month protracted negotiation with the Contractors proved difficult. The carpet fibre was supplied by a chemical firm in Belgium, the carpet itself manufactured in Yorkshire and the firm that laid the courts Charles Lawrence Surfaces Ltd had sold their business. The LTA Technical Department supported the club with a site visit, the facts were established, and the courts replaced in 2006, the club contributing £17,625 towards fair wear and tear. The Completion of this project was delayed when a 13-metre role of carpet was stolen from the grounds. Directors of Charles Lawrence Surfaces Ltd, Sir Charles Lawrence and **David Blamire**, were extremely helpful in supporting the Club through the complex commercial issues, with Clive Garlick and Bob Adams representing the Club throughout.

David Warner was appointed grounds-man in March 1994, and over the next 25 years David maintained the courts and grounds to a high standard, with the Lomond Park courts being set aside as "stand by" for the Scottish courts Championships in 1995 and 1998 in the event that rain affected play at the Edinburgh Dyvour Grass Courts Stockbridge.

In 2007, £3,200 was invested in a tractor with brush, which reduced grounds-man time and allowed optimum brush pressure to the court.

On Court - Seniors

The new playing surface encouraged higher levels of performance. The Club recorded Tournament success in 1983 with **Ian Henderson** and **Ann Mitchell** winning the East of Scotland Restricted Mixed Doubles.

Ann Mitchell partnered Mrs. M. Rennie as a runner-up in the East of Scotland Restricted Ladies Doubles and Ian Henderson partnering Ann Mitchell won the 1983 Pringle Cup, the first time Lomond Park had won this event.

In 1985, Moira Dobbie and Hamish McGregor won the Craigmillar Open Championship, defeating Adrian Bernadette Capaldi in an all Lomond Park final. In the same year, Margo Paton & Sinclair Campbell recorded victory in the Pringle Cup. In 1998 & 1999, Hamish McGregor & Moira Dobbie celebrated backto-back victories in Craigmillar Park Open Cup. Further Club success was recorded in the Pringle Cup, Moira Dobbie partnering Jamie Petrie recorded victory in 2000, Margaret Main and partner Graham Milne won in 2003, Barbara Quigley partnering Clive Hembury winning in 2004 and Margaret Main partnering Andrew Thompson were defeated 2006 Pringle Cup finalists.

Club Championships

In Men's Singles, **Ronnie Sloan** had a hat-trick of championship wins in 1976-80. **Hamish McGregor** recorded 12 Championship wins (1988-2006) with **Ian Henderson** and **Jamie Petrie** each recording 3 Singles victories.

Men's Doubles Championship victories were recorded by **Charles Milne** and the enthusiastic **John Nairn** who won back-to-back titles in 1973-74. **David Anderson** won 3 straight titles (1975-77) partnering **David Reid** and then twice partnering **Gordon Chalmers. Sinclair Campbell & John Brindle** recorded three victories (1977-88). **Charles Robertson** celebrated 3 doubles championships spanning 20 years, partnering **Jamie Petrie** on two occasions. **Ian Henderson** recorded 8 Men's Doubles titles in 11 years, 1979-89. partnering **Donald Allan** on 3 occasions.

East of Scotland Leagues

The improvement in playing surface and the Club's focus on junior coaching contributed to the general improvement in playing standard. In 1974, the Club ran two Men's teams with the Men's 1st team playing in Division 7 and by 1981 the 1st team had climbed to Division 4. The Men's 2nd team languished in Division 7 in 1981 and they had reached Division 3 status by 2005.

A Men's 3rd team was formed in 1994, with a blend of experience and junior players, and they gained league promotion in three successive seasons 1995-97, winning 24 out of 28 matches.

In 2004, all three men's teams were promoted with the 1st team led by Hamish McGregor gaining promotion to Division 1. (The first time a senior Lomond Park side had achieved Division One status since the late 1950s – a tremendous effort!). The squad included Hamish McGregor, Martin Hendrie (professional coach), Ian Campbell, Clive Hembury, David McCall, Jamie Petrie, Charles Robertson, Andrew Thomson, Howard Pether, Richard Horsfall & Graeme Milne with half of the squad coming from the Club's own coaching program.

The Ladies 1st team had played consistently in Division 4 prior to 1981 and reached Division 2 standard by 2006. The Lomond Park Ladies' 1st team who had never won a league title in 25 years 1981-2005 brought the famine to an end by winning the Division 3 Title in 2005.

The Ladies 2nd Team played fairly consistently in Division 5 1981- 2006 and encouraged by the new Men's 3rd team performance, the Ladies successfully formed a 3rd team in 1997, starting in Division 9 and reaching Division 6 by 2005. A ladies 4th team was launched in 2006.

On Court - Junior Tennis Development

Towards the end of the 1980s, the junior coaching program run by **Trish Brindle, Angela Horsfall, Margo Croan** and **Susan Brown** began to bear fruit, raising the profile of Junior tennis at Lomond Park:

The Boys under 18 team won the East Division One title in 1986, 1989, 1990, the Boys under 14 team won the Division One title 1987 and 1988. The Girls under 18 team won the Division One title in 1996 and 1997.

There were personal successes for Hamish McGregor and Lorn Lawson in 1987 & 1988 at the Dunfermline Open tournament. Meanwhile in 1988, Jamie Petrie won the East Lothian Championships under 14 Boys Singles and Lorn Lawson was runner up in the National Parks under 18 Boys singles and the following year Jamie Petrie won the Edinburgh and Scottish National Parks under 18 Boys Singles tournament and reached the British National Parks U18 semi-final.

In 1990, **Jonathan Guy** won the Dunfermline under 12 boys doubles partnering **Neil Dickson** (Duffus) and with the same partner was a runner up in the Scottish Grass Courts under 12 doubles. The Dunfermline Junior event proved a popular venue for Lomond Park juniors where **Jonathan Guy** and **Richard Horsfall** registered success in both singles and doubles in 1991.

Rory Allan was selected to represent Scotland in the Boys under 12 age group in an International against Wales in 1992 and went on to win the Mortonhall under 10 boys' tournament and win the East Boys Doubles under 12 partnering **J. Collins** in that year. Rory was coached by the highly regarded East County Men's Captain **John Patterson** from the Thistle Club.

Jill McIntyre joined the Club's girls' junior coaching team with notable success. In 1995, Jill's daughter Alison McIntyre partnering Gillian Fraser won the North Berwick under 16 girls doubles and in 1996 Gillian Fraser won the East of Scotland Closed Championship under 16 girls' singles held at Lomond Park. Gillian and Pamela Fraser reached the girls under 18 doubles East of Scotland final. The following year, Alison McIntyre won the East of Scotland Closed Girls under 16 Doubles.

Administration

As the Club prospered, and membership levels increased, so too did the demand for more teams for both seniors, juniors and veterans, with a clear focus on professional coaching and a requirement for the Club to compete with the commercially operated Tennis Clubs.

Ronnie Sloan served on the East of Scotland Committee from 1982-84 and the Lomond Park song which was published in the E.S.L.T.A Brochure on launching the club's floodlights is attributed to him.

Trish Brindle was a tremendous servant to the club and wider tennis community and held office on the East of Scotland Committee for fourteen years from 1992-2006, elected Honorary President E.S.L.T.A 1999–2001, serving the sport at National level as an SLTA Counsellor 1999-2005.

In 1992, Trinity Recreation Club Ltd and the Tennis and Bowling Clubs agreed that each club should establish a "Sinking Reserve Fund" to provide against future financial difficulties, a fixed sum to be set aside each year.

From 1993 Scottish Tennis data, Lomond Park was confirmed as having the twelfth largest club membership in Scotland. The provision of a first class all year-round playing facility attracted a record membership of 548 in 1994 and resulted in the introduction of shoe tagging to control membership. The Club extended court floodlighting to Courts 3, 4 and 5 at a cost of f, 9,000. Progress on court was met with the age-long problem and challenge of Clubhouse and Grounds security, with money being stolen from the floodlight meters and vandalism and youths causing problems in the park.

Tony Hart, a long-standing Club member, on his retirement to Malta in 1986, presented the "**Hart Cup**" to be played for annually by mixed doubles couples with a combined age of > 90.

Bill Aspin launched the club's internet website "lomondparktennis.co.uk" in 2002. **Bill** also drew the clubhouse sketch on page 3 of this book.



Ian Campbell held the joint positions of Match Secretary and Web-Master, first used the club's website in 2003 to publish the club championship draws and updated results over the internet during the tournament.

As membership levels grew, the Club became more complicated to manage. In 1997, the length of service for the Honorary President and Vice President was reduced to one year vice president, two years president and one year vice president recognizing the now increased workload of the position. Through time, the Club became more reliant on the contribution of committed individuals and families alike.

In 2006, Margo Croan, who had previously served as Club Secretary and been involved in the successful junior coaching program, was elected Honorary Club President, the Second Lady President in Club History.

However, the Club's success over the years relied on many members giving of their free time as unsung ambassadors and loyal supporters of the Club.

Jean Smith former club Secretary, (whose grand-father-in-law Sir Malcolm Smith was the first "TRC" Chairman), Dorothy Thom, Peter Bremner, John & Isabel Nairn, Sheila Hunter, Jill Crosthwaite, Carol & Hugh McClelland, Judith & James Lawson, Rob & Daphne Blair, Gordon & Gill Kerr, Ros Trail, Kay Campbell, Fiona Laing, Peter Lynn, Barbera Quigley, Charles Robertson, Ian Campbell, Ann Davidson, Richard Arnott, Fiona Lauder, Grahame Milne, Simon Goldsmith, Bob Adams & Howard Pether.

Clubhouse Refurbishment 2004

Adrian Capaldi, Hamish McGregor and Cath Macrae project managed the clubhouse refurbishment at a cost of £15,000 with floor joist replacement, kitchen refurbishment, changing rooms adding personal locker space, rewiring throughout and redecoration both internally and externally including painting, floor sanding and provision of furniture.





Off Court

From the mid-1980s to date, two prominent features in the Club social calendar were the junior finals BBQ, always well attended, and the



annual 20 overs per side cricket match against the "Woodcutters XI", played at Bangholm playing fields. The Lomond Park XI invariably led by Sinclair Campbell or Charles Robertson were fortunate to be able to call on Fraser Dall, Donald Allan, Rob Blair, Richard Horsfall with Kerr Petrie volunteering as wicketkeeper. For this aging side, it was fortunate the Club was always able to unearth aspiring talent from the junior ranks for some fast running between the wickets.

Willie Henderson BBQ duties

In 1984, Glen Ross organized a football match with Lomond Park men taking on Waverley Tennis Club. Some Lomond Park players had come out of retirement, and by half-time, several may have wished they had not bothered, losing by six goals to one. The competitive Lomond men selected a more youthful squad a few weeks later and obtained a revenge win over the Waverley Club.

Wooden Tennis Rackets

Wooden tennis rackets such as the Dunlop Maxply Fort with cat gut strings were replaced in the 1980s with racket frames made from composite materials including carbon-fibre, graphite, or titanium alloys and strings made of synthetic polyimide or polymers. The new rackets had a larger head area, provided a larger sweet spot and more power.

Chapter 8

Second Century Challenges – A period of Records (2008-23)

Entering the Second Century

President **Margo Croan** led the Centenary Committee and the many members who have helped make the Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club Centenary Celebrations truly memorable. The photographs of the Centenary Celebrations, the enjoyment, happy faces, friendships, comradery, families together, all shared from the love of tennis.

The Club embarked on the challenges of a new century. Lomond Park is proud to retain its position as one of the largest membership clubs in Scotland. Keeping pace with members expectations, the Club can offer a new artificial grass court surface, a refurbished clubhouse, membership levels in the period 2008 - 2023 averaging 600, a thriving Junior section, a sound financial base secured over many years of careful accumulation and investment in facilities, balancing subscription levels with value for money. A Diverse Club, catering for all ages, offering Social and Competitive Tennis opportunities. The Club offers competitive team tennis in the East of Scotland leagues with 5 Men's teams, 4 Ladies teams, Veterans teams, and 10 Junior Age Group teams. The focus on Club sponsored Professional Junior Coaching is popular in developing tennis talent, not forgetting a social events program and charity events.

This was a period of Club records.

- o Club Membership levels exceeded 600 for the first time in 2020
- o Record Investment in the Court Facilities £ 121,000 in 2020
- o A record 44 Club Championship wins for **Hamish McGregor**
- o A record 39 Club Championship Titles for Jacquie Edwards
- o Men's team earn promotion to Division 1 in 2019 and achieved their highest league position of 4th in 1921,1922 & 1923
- o **David Warner** (Grounds-man) 25-year service (1994-2019)
- O The Ladies 1st team gained promotion to Division 2 in 2023, their highest league ranking since 2006
- Bernadette Capaldi recorded her 11th Championship Title over a record breaking 34-year period (1990-2023)

On Court - East of Scotland Leagues

The Men's 1st team competed mainly in Division 2 or 3; however, the team gained promotion to Division 1 in 2019, retaining their position in the top league and finishing in 4 th place in 2021, 2022 & 2023.

As an indication of a growing club playing strength, the Men's 2nd team played in division 4 to 6, Men's 3rd team in Division 5 to 7, Men's 4th team had climbed from Division 9 up to 7 and in 2022, a 5 th Men's team joined the leagues. In most years the Club utilized 50 players to support the five Men's teams.

Club Championships

During this period, the Club had two outstanding records to celebrate.

Hamish P. McGregor recorded forty-four Championship victories, more than any other player in the 116-year Club history, spanning a twenty four-year period, 1988-2011, **Hamish** recorded sixteen Singles Titles, fifteen Men's Doubles Titles and thirteen Mixed Doubles Titles.

Jacquie Edwards, recorded thirty-nine Championship victories, second only to **Hamish** in the Club's history, with seventeen Singles Titles, ten Doubles Titles and twelve Mixed Doubles Titles. This was achieved over a thirty-year period from 1989-2018, demonstrating a sustained and commendable level of fitness and tennis quality. At the 2017 AGM, **Jacquie** was presented with a glass trophy in recognition of ten consecutive Ladies Singles Championships wins 2008-17.

In Ladies Singles, **Harriet Balloch** won 3 Championships in 2019-22 and a hat-trick of Ladies Doubles Titles with various partners 2021-23.

In Men's Doubles **Euan Ward** and **David Reid** won a hat-trick of Championship Titles 2021-2023.

Sloan was Finance Convenor on a committee formed to consider the viability of the first All Weather Courts in 1978, and following a high risk plan involving Grants, Member Bonds, Advance Subscriptions and a Generous Individual's Loan, the project was delivered. The co-ordinated efforts of Joyce Campbell and Club wide fund-raising participation were fundamental. This was the turning point for the Club as we know it today.

Ronnie has represented the club on the ESLTA Board 1982-1984, Honorary Club President 1985-1987, recipient of the Centenary President's Bowl in 2022, 4 times Club Champion in Singles and Doubles and for many years represented the Men's teams.

At the Club Centenary Celebrations, **Ronnie** was our "Superman Guest", and in 2011 loaned for clubhouse display "a framed T Shirt signed by the March 2011 AEGON GB Davis Cup Team and in 2014, donated to the club an "Oak Role of Honour Board for Past Champions and Presidents from the 1970s".

A. Kerr Petrie: Honorary Life Membership 2014

Kerr is the most popular, likeable, and helpful of members. He has served as Club President 2000-01 and importantly supported the club over many years on clubhouse and court maintenance tasks, always completed to a high standard. **Kerr** was a recipient of the Centenary President's Bowl in 2011.

Club Management and Constitution in the Second Century

The expanded organization required a new management structure to meet membership expectations. The Constitution was amended in 2011 and 2015 to accommodate LTA governance guidance, resulting in the following Club management structure.

A part-time Administrator was employed to manage the Website, Coaching and Junior Teams. Through technology use, the Match Secretary role was redundant and since 2017 no figure head Men's Captain was elected, the team captains successfully self-managing the squads.

Historically, The Lomond Park Company Ltd, who owned the land, had let the Tennis Courts and Clubhouse through Trinity Recreation Club Limited, who in turn had sub-let the facility to the Tennis club. In 2017 it was decided for efficiency that the Tennis Club would enter a 30-year lease, directly with The Lomond Park Company Ltd. Mike Polson, Gordon Kerr, Ian Harris and Kerr Petrie secured the new arrangement for the Club. Linton Horsfall was involved in the dissolution of Trinity Recreation Club Ltd to complete the process.

Investment Shareholding in "The Lomond Park Co Ltd"

In 2018, following the dissolution of Trinity Recreation Club Ltd, the Tennis Club were granted an investment of 50 Ordinary Shares of £, 1 each in "The Lomond Park Co Ltd" out of a Total share issue of 6,050. Trinity Bowling Club were also granted 50 shares.

Over the years, these athletes have been managed by Ian Harris, David Law, Mike Polson, Gordon Kerr and Andrew Anderson.

The Tennis Club in the Community

The tennis Club plays an important role in the community, and has opened its courts at the time of the annual Trinity Gala held in August each year to allow community members and local primary schools to "try tennis" sessions. The Club holds Annual Charity events including a "Strawberry Tea" in aid of Breast Cancer Research and "The Sandy Macrae Charity Cup".

Coronavirus Covid 19 Global Pandemic

Year 2020 will be remembered for the Coronavirus Covid 19 Global Pandemic. Government Restrictions to contain the spread of the respiratory virus resulted in no tennis being played from late March until the end of June. Restrictions then followed on play, involving player hand sanitization to reduce possible virus transfer. All Summer League Matches and the Club Championships were cancelled. A shortened form of inter club team tennis was organized in September, but with no teas afterwards.

During the Autumn easing of Covid19 restrictions, **Adrian Capaldi** organized box leagues within the Club for singles and doubles play, and these proved very popular. With many workers furloughed and working from home during the Pandemic, interest in tennis increased.

For the first time in the club's history, the AGM was held with members using "Zoom" video conference calling to participate in the meeting.

Facilities and Court Resurfacing 2020

In 2015, under the guidance of **Ian Harris**, the practice wall area was refurbished with new carpet, overhead beam support, a relocated tractor shed and BBQ area. In a joint bowling club project in 2016, members were trained to use a newly installed life-saving "Heart Defibrillator".

The Court Surface was renewed in 2020, the previous carpet laid in 2006 with the project led by President Ian Harris; Alan Malcolm (Club Administrator) & Jamie Verhaere (Club Coach). The contractor, Doe Sports (North) Ltd, addressed existing drainage issues, laid a new tarmac base on top of the original Elastosol Court Surface, providing five sand dressed artificial grass courts (DOE Mono Pro product), included new ground level kerb, new perimeter fencing and Net Posts. Court 1 was also moved slightly to the west to reduce the serve receiving player contact with the hedge from wide placed serves. The result was five excellent well drained courts. The project cost f, 121,000, the largest investment ever made by the Club in its 113-year history, funded from carefully accumulated reserves. The Club successfully applied for an £18,000 Grant from Viridor Waste, who recycled the old court carpet. Coincidentally, the Club received a very welcome £ 25,000 Government Covid Resilience Grant to address the financial impact of Covid on the Club. Additionally, The Lomond Park Company arranged for a drain to be inserted in the park across the breadth of courts 4 and 5 to deal with park surface rainwater.



2023, Energy efficient LED floodlight bulbs costing £, 18,950 were installed on courts all and following a routine property inspection a major repair to the 100- year-old clubhouse roof $cost \neq 33,880.$

Chapter 12

Hall of Fame (Chronological Order)

David S. Crawford

David was a founding member of Lomond Park in 1907. He had been a former Craighall Lawn Tennis Club Singles Champion and Lomond Park Men's Singles Champion in 1909 & 1910. He was credited with considerable development work at Lomond Park and at County level, and whilst records are incomplete, it is believed he was Honorary Club President at Lomond Park for 16 years between 1910 and 1926. **David** presented to the Club in 1912, the current Gentleman's Singles Championship Cup.

Over many years **David** was the Club's court ranger managing the maintenance of the courts; a major task given the court surface and equipment available. He retired from the Club in 1926 and made an Honorary Life Member.

Alex F. Currie

Alex F. Currie worked tirelessly for the game of tennis, both at Club and County level. He served as East of Scotland Honorary President 1925-26, at National level served the SLTA in 1920 and 1926 and elected Lomond Park Honorary President for 5 years 1930-34 and was invited to become an Honorary Life Member in 1946.

Alex partnering Club-mate **Reg Butcher** played in the 1919 Scottish Men's Doubles semi-final, and partnering **James McDonald** from the Club reached the 1925 Scottish Veterans Men's Doubles Final. **Alex** captained the East of Scotland County team in 1930.

Alex recorded eleven Club Championship victories including two Men's Singles titles in 1930 & 1931, six Men's Doubles Championships between 1923-32, and three Mixed Doubles Titles in 1922, 1928 & 1929. Previously, **Alex** was the 1911 Trinity Tennis Club Men's Singles Champion.

Kathleen Evans Little



Kathleen Little was arguably one of the finest players to represent the Club. She reached many Scottish Championship semi-finals and finals in the period 1913-25, in both singles and doubles, but was unlucky not to have recorded victory in a Scottish Championship final.

She represented the East of Scotland County Team on several occasions and was the only "uncapped" player in the East of Scotland Ladies Team that played in the final of the British Championships in 1924.

She was a Scottish Cup winner for five years as a member of the Liberton Tennis club in 1924 –28. At that time, the Liberton Ladies team were considered the strongest club side in Scotland. **Kathleen** won the Liberton Ladies Singles Championship, a great achievement given the pedigree of her international clubmates.

In the Lomond Park Club Championships, **Kathleen** won eleven Titles, including six Ladies Singles Championship 1921-29 (no trophy before that date), two Ladies Doubles Titles 1924-1925, partnering her younger sister **Eleanor E. Little** (no trophies before 1924) and three Mixed Doubles Title 1922-29 partnering **Alex F. Currie**

Kathleen no doubt achieved further on court success; however, club records were incomplete in the early years

Eustace Reginald Butcher



Reginald Butcher was one of the most impressive players to represent Lomond Park. He represented the East Scotland County team on many occasions and regularly reached Scottish Championships semi-final or final during 1919-30 in both Men's and Mixed Doubles. In 1919, the Lomond Park pairing of Reg Butcher and Alex F. Currie lost in the Scottish Men's Doubles semifinal.

In 1923, **Reg** won the Scottish Open Mixed Doubles Championships partnering

Mrs. Hugh Wilson (Liberton)

and went on to win the 1926 East Mixed Doubles Championship partnering **Mrs. Robin Welsh**. Partnering **A.W. Banks** (Murrayfield), **Reg** won the 1932 Scottish Men's Doubles Veterans Title.

Reg won fourteen Club Championships, including seven Men's singles titles 1919-27, with a run of five consecutive victories 1923-27. Considering his doubles expertise, it is surprising **Reg** only recorded two Men's doubles championship titles in 1922 and 1924, however this may have been influenced by the playing strength of his club-mates, **Alex F. Currie, James McDonald** and **Sydney W. B. Herald.**

Reg and his wife Helen won four Mixed Doubles titles in 1923-26, and in 1927 won the Mixed Doubles partnering **Christine Bucher.** Later **Reg** became the Inverleith Club Men's Singles Champion 1929-1933.

Reg gained twenty-one Scottish Badminton caps, and was six times Scottish Badminton Champion in both Men's and Mixed Doubles (1922 - 35).

Miss Maimie K. H. Allan (Receiving trophy from Bessie Allan)



Maimie K. H. Allan won a remarkable twenty-eight Club Championship titles over a nineteen-year period and demonstrated great consistency in winning eleven Ladies Singles Championships spanning fifteen years (1938-55) and would probably have added to her trophy successes but for the intervention of World War Two.

Maimie won eleven Ladies Doubles Championship Titles during (1938 – 56) (four partnering Mrs. I. Seale 1953-56) and recorded six Mixed Doubles Championship Titles (1930–54), including three titles partnering her brother Alex.

Maimie represented the Club in East of Scotland and Scottish Championships on a number of occasions.

Miss E. Bessie Allan (Presenting trophy to Alex Allan)



E. Bessie Allan, sister of Maimie, won twenty-six Club Championships over a fifteen-year period, including ten Ladies Singles Titles (1925–37) spanning twelve years, and was unfortunate to play in the same era as **Kathleen Little**. Bessie also recorded thirteen Ladies Doubles Championship victories (1926-39) including an astonishing eleven consecutive titles partnering **Miss A.C. Ross**, and three Mixed Doubles Titles. The intervention of WW2 surely restricted her tennis success.

Alex K. Allan

Alex served as Club President 1940-47 and Treasurer 1929-36.

On court, **Alex** reached the 1923 Scottish Boys Singles Championship semi-final where he was narrowly beaten by **J. S. Pringle**, who later become a club member. **Alex** partnered **Victor Woodhawks** (Murrayfield) to win the Scottish Veterans Men's Doubles Championship in 1952. **Alex** went on to record twelve Club Championship Titles, winning the Men's Singles in 1928 & 1932, four Men's Doubles Titles in 1928 and 1930 and partnered his Boys Singles rival **J. S. Pringle** to victory in 1947 & 1948 and six Mixed Doubles Titles between 1930-51 partnered by sister **Maimie** three times, sister **Bessie** once and his wife on two occasions.

W. F. G. (Bill) Lord

As an administrator, **Bill** served as Treasurer 1938-39 and was elected Honorary Club President twice (1953–55) and recalled to lead the club during a challenging period (1974-76).

On court, **Bill** registered two Men's Doubles Championship Titles in 1953 and 1958, and three Mixed Doubles Victories in 1946, 1954 & 1957.

Bill Captained the Men's team in 1953 and made an Honorary Life member in 1958.



Dorothy Liddel

popular team member, Dorothy recorded a total of Championship sixteen club Titles in a short nine-year period 1970-78, including four Ladies Singles Titles, six Ladies Doubles Championships and Mixed Doubles partnering Gordon Chalmers, including a run of five Mixed consecutive Championship victories 1971-75. **Dorothy** was Ladies Captain for three years 1971-73



Ian G. Henderson



Ian's trademark heavy topspin forehand helped register seventeen Club Championship Titles including three Men's Singles Championships 1979–84 and eight Men's Doubles Championships 1979-89, partnering **Donald Allan** on three occasions in 1986, 1987 and 1989.

In 1985, Ian was reigning champion in Men's Singles, Men's Doubles and Mixed Doubles, however his title defence came to a dramatic end when partnering **Dr Donald Allan** in the men's doubles semi-final, playing against a young **Hamish McGregor and Lorn Lawson**, Ian fell awkwardly and suffered a fractured skull. Ian made a full recovery and today plays at the Hatton club where he has won the Men's Singles Title. The injury prevented Ian recording 6 straight men's double title victories.

In Mixed Doubles, Ian recorded six Club Championship titles 1981-87 including a hattrick of titles with Margo Valentine 1985-87. Partnering Mrs. Ann Mitchell, Ian won the

Pringle Cup in 1983 for the first time in the history of the Club, and later that year with **Ann** won the East Restricted Mixed Doubles Title. Further success was to follow, and partnering **Margo Valentine** won the 1985 Craigmillar Park Open Mixed Doubles Championship.

Joyce Campbell



The Club had borrowed substantially to fund the installation of the first all-weather courts and floodlights on courts 1 and 2 in 1982. **Joyce Campbell** led a Social Committee, which galvanized the membership into a sustained fund-raising effort over several years, which was fun and importantly helped reduce the Club debt. **Joyce's** enthusiasm for the task cannot be underestimated. The Club members really got behind **Joyce's** fundraising leadership, a lot of hard work, with incredible financial benefits.

Events included: Annual Coffee morning with a bottle stall and beat the goalie, Jumble Sale in Portobello Town Hall, Raffles, Monthly Prize Draw, Horse Race Nights, Progressive meals, Dances, BBQ, Car Treasure Hunt to North Berwick and a sponsored cycle to Gullane in appalling weather conditions.

These were hard times for the Club, but the funding and establishment of all-weather courts with floodlights underpinned the facility that we enjoy today. The facilities attracted new members, the playing standards rose, the Club thrived and became debt free, and Lomond Park can now take its place as one of the leading Scottish clubs today.

Cynthia M.S. Bull



In 1978 **Cynthia** was a member of the committee led by **Michael Pentland**, formed to decide the future of the Club, considering the project options of "Squash Racket Courts" or "All Weather Tennis Courts". The committee worked tirelessly on the project, and the decision to finance all weather tennis courts in 1982 underpinned the facilities that we all enjoy today. The club was in a perilous financial position and **Cynthia** was the steady hand looking after Club finances as Honorary Treasurer for 9 years (1972-80).

A regular organizer of the Coffee morning held in May, and other fundraising activities, these were essential fund sources to keep the Club afloat.

A Ladies Doubles Club Champion (1976-77), **Cynthia** was involved in the development of the successful Junior tennis coaching on Saturday mornings in the 1980s. **Cynthia** and **Nic Bull** donated to the Club, the Boys Under 18 Singles Championship "Bull Tankard" in 1981.

Much to the surprise of the opposition, **Cynthia** once opened the batting for Lomond Park in the annual cricket match against the Woodcutters XI, long before women's cricket was as popular as it is today.

Moira Dobbie



Moira's mother, **Joyce Boothman**, attained a Scottish senior tennis ranking of no 3, and with the advantage of a tennis court in the back garden, there were few excuses to avoid tennis practice. As a junior, then a member of Murrayfield Tennis Club, **Moira** was selected for the Scottish age group tennis squads and represented Scotland under 14 and under 16 in the National Championships.

Moira's successes included: Scottish under 15 Singles Champion 1967, Finalist in Scottish under 18 Singles 1969, Scottish under 18 Girls Doubles Champion 1969, Finalist in the Scottish Schools Nestle Tennis Tournament and represented Scotland in the British Schools Tournament 1969. Moira was also Under 18 Scottish Covered Courts Girls Champion 1968. She has represented East of Scotland at County Level and is currently a member of the over 50 squad.

Since joining Lomond Park, **Moira** recorded eleven Club Championship victories including five Ladies Singles Titles (1997–2002), six Ladies Doubles titles (1996–2002) with five of them partnering **Margo Valentine**, including a run of five championships (1996-2000). **Moira** captained the Ladies Team for 4 seasons in (1997-2000).

Hamish P. McGregor



Hamish (I) benefited from the club's Saturday morning coaching under the tutelage of Trish Brindle, Susan Brown and Angela Horsfall and three years ESLTA junior coaching.

Partnering **Lorn Lawson** (r), the duo were victorious in the highly rated Dunfermline under 18 Boys Doubles Tournament in 1987 & 1988.

A highlight for **Hamish** was winning the Division 1 under 18 Boys title with **Lorn Lawson, Jonathan Brindle & Ian Campbell** in 1987, and in 1986 & 1987 being a member of the Stewarts Melville team that won the Scottish Schools Tennis Cup. **Hamish** was a member of the Stirling University team, winners of the Central Scotland Division 1 league.

Hamish recorded forty-four Club Championship Titles over a twenty four-year period, more than any player in Club history, including sixteen Men's Singles Titles 1988-2011, fifteen Men's Doubles Titles 1990–2011, on eight occasions partnering Lorn Lawson. In Mixed Doubles 1990–2011, Hamish recorded thirteen titles, ten of these partnering Jacquie Edwards.

Hamish confided in me that he was only promoted to the Men's I team after he partnered Lorn for a season in the second team undefeated and won the Men's Singles Title. Apparently, the Gents selection policy was unclear at the time! Men's Doubles exponents John Brindle, Sinclair Campbell and Ian Henderson are attributed with helping Hamish take the step from Junior Champion to court-wise Senior player.

Hamish is a qualified tennis coach and captained the Club for eight years (1991-2005), leading the first team to Division 1 promotion in 2005, the first time in fifty years that a Lomond Park side had played in Division 1.

Margo Valentine



Margo has won an impressive twenty-eight club championship titles over a twenty-six-year period, relying on strong base line ground strokes. Her victories include ten Ladies Singles Championship wins during 1977–1996, spanning nineteen years.

In Ladies Doubles, **Margo** celebrated thirteen Ladies Doubles Titles in 1978 –2002, over a period of twenty-five years, six of these titles partnering **Fiona Ramage** and including four successive titles in 1978 – 1981.

In Mixed Doubles, **Margo** achieved five championship victories, including three back-to-back titles partnering **Ian Henderson** 1985-1987.

Margo captained the Ladies' Team in 1988.

Partnering **Sinclair Campbell, Margo** won the Pringle Cup in 1985 and later that year, **Margo** and **Ian Henderson** won the Craigmillar Park Open Championship Mixed Doubles.

Patricia E. Brindle



As an administrator, **Trish** has been a tremendous servant to the Club and wider tennis community over a number of years and held office on the East of Scotland Committee for fourteen years from 1992-2006, elected Honorary President E.S.L.T.A 1999–2001, serving the sport at National level as an SLTA Councillor 1999-2005.

At Lomond Park, **Trish** served as Match Secretary 1979-81, Ladies Captain 1989-90, recipient of the Centenary President's Bowl in 2010, and on court won four Ladies Doubles Titles 1986-89 partnering **Trish Morse.**

She was also a four times winner of the Hart Cup, partnering **Sinclair Campbell** and as part of a team of club junior coaches, helped develop the now institutional "Saturday morning nippers coaching sessions" which have provided a generation of players with the skills to enjoy the game.

Jacquie Edwards



Jacquie recorded thirty-nine Club Championship Titles, achieved over an impressive thirty-year time span, 1989-2018, including seventeen Ladies Singles Victories, with a run of eleven consecutive championships during 2008-2018.

In Ladies Doubles, **Jacquie** accumulated ten Titles including four backto-back wins partnering **Margaret Main** (2006-09), and in Mixed Doubles, recorded twelve Championship victories, partnering **Hamish McGregor** on ten occasions.

Jacquie served as Ladies Club Captain 2008 – 10.






When I was a lad, a liny wee lad, my coach he said to me "Come see the Northe Eve played on many far-off courts and travelled many a mile. I've missed some balls and
