Foreword

In it's Centenary year, Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club is a leading tennis club in Edinburgh and the East of Scotland. The current membership can look back with gratitude to it's predecessors, who had the initial vision and later the courage and spirit, in the most challenging of circumstances, to preserve the club and develop it into the excellent facility that we all enjoy today.

At the turn of the century, local residents in Trinity joined together to protect the amenity of the parkland from developers through the formation of The Lomond Park Company Limited, which has preserved the park as a recreation area to this day.

The amalgamation of Lomond Park Tennis Club with Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1921 was an ideal marriage. Lomond Park had access to the ground for tennis court development, and The Trinity Club brought with it considerable wealth, and the combined club had an enviable playing strength. The club's newly found reserves provided much of the finance required to resurface the three lower courts with red blaes and to create the upper courts four and five in the same material. Later, the clubhouse facilities were extended to meet the needs of the enlarged club.

The end of World War II hostilities found the club in a state of near bankruptcy, and but for the intervention of the parent sports organisation, Trinity Recreation Limited, and the efforts of a loyal group of members in the post war period, the club would not exist today.

Increased competition from other sports in the late 1960's and early 1970's again brought the viability of the club into question. Following detailed discussions, the club took a calculated financial gamble to borrow a substantial sum of money to invest in five low maintenance all-weather court surfaces that would support all year round play with the addition of flood-lights. This decision proved to be a turning point for the club.

The later introduction of new technology Artificial Sand Filled Grass courts in 1991, proved very popular and the membership built to today's healthy levels.

The club now approaches its centenary celebrations, with the publication of this Centenary booklet, which we hope has succeeded in capturing some of the spirit that inspired the club over these years. We owe a debt of gratitude to Clive for his tenacity, unflagging effort and enthusiasm for the project and getting this history of the club into print.

Chapter 1

The Beginning of Tennis at Lomond Park

In 1905, a resident of 18 Lomond Road, **Robert S. Alexander**, together with eleven other local residents, bought Lomond Park, and sold it to The Lomond Park Company Limited "LPC" for £ 6,015. The key objectives of the company were to acquire the ground, retain the park for games and recreation, plant trees and shrubs, and to let any part of the land.

Shortly after the formation of The Lomond Park Company, Trinity Recreation Club Limited "TRC" was formed in 1907 with its shares held by members of Trinity Bowling Club and Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club. The role of "TRC" was to lease the ground from The Lomond Park Company and to promote recreational activity in the park and to assist in the administration of the clubs. **Sir Malcom Smith K.B.E.**,the first Chairman of "T.R.C" and a Director of The Lomond Park Company, together with **John Dewar** who was also a Director in both companies were the main promoters of the tennis club.

Our neighbours for the past century, Trinity Bowling Club, opened in 1855, with their bowling green originally located on the west side of York Road. The ground was not ideal and could only accommodate 50 playing members. In early 1907, Trinity Bowling Club submitted a plan to The Lomond Park Company to lease a portion of the Park for use as a Bowling Green and Lawn Tennis Courts. In October of that year approval was given to develop the plans. The Trinity Bowling Club relocated from York Road to their present location in 1909.

The area now occupied by the lower senior tennis courts number one to three, located next to Lennox Row previously formed a duck pond.

Why the name Lomond Park?

It has been suggested that the name 'Lomond Park' may have been derived from the name of a ship built in the late nineteenth century registered at Leith.

Official Opening May 1908

"The Scotsman" newspaper on 01 June 1908 records the formal Opening ceremony: New Tennis Courts at Leith





"On Saturday, the tennis courts and pavilion erected at Trinity by Trinity Recreation Limited were formerly opened by Chairman Sir Malcolm Smith. There had been a large number of applications and the list is already closed. Adjacent to the courts is a bowling green, and the membership of that also is almost full. The courts are laid with a composition of sand, tar and sawdust (laid on a bed of ashes, giving a fine surface and it is intended to flood the courts in winter for curling purposes)."


ORIGINAL 1905 OUTLINE PLAN Recreation Ground

Chapter 2

The Foundation of Lawn Tennis

The All England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club

Since Lawn Tennis was first played in 1872, originating from "Real" or "Royal Tennis," the game has developed and changed considerably. In the current tennis era, it is hard for tennis players, and spectators alike, to believe that the early courts were shaped like an hourglass, distinct from the familiar rectangular courts. In addition, the court nets were not horizontal in appearance as at present, but dipped very sharply towards the middle of the net; measuring 4 ft 6 inches at the posts and 4 ft at mid court. Scotland lays claim to the oldest "Real Tennis" court in the world, built at Falkland Palace, Fife in 1539 by **King James V**.

Major W.C. Wingfield could be christened the founder of lawn tennis through the development of his game called "sphairistike" (sticky for short). The game was termed "lawn tennis" later when the "All England Croquet Club (Wimbledon)" changed its name to the "All England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club," and in 1877 the first Wimbledon Championships were held.

The upper classes influenced the game of Lawn Tennis during the course of its early years and tennis became a favourite weekend leisure pursuit. Many of the early players tended to be businessmen, students or those in the legal profession. The game's popularity with the upper classes is clearly demonstrated by the fact that the first Wimbledon Championships were arranged to end by a Friday so that affluent spectators would not miss the Eton versus Harrow cricket match at Lords cricket ground on Saturday! However, the lower classes were slowly introduced to tennis at the end of the 19th century as the sport was introduced into the State school education system.

Development of Tennis in the East of Scotland

Focusing attention now on the East of Scotland specifically, the first tennis clubs in this area were introduced in the 1880's, and a major initiative was the incorporation of the Edinburgh Lawn Tennis Company which provided the first indoor tennis courts in Edinburgh. These primitive indoor "facilities" were housed in a hall known as the "Tin Temple," located at the east end of the Grange cricket ground in Stockbridge and comprised of two indoor tennis courts, dressing rooms and a small viewing gallery.

In the years to follow, sports pursuits in general, and tennis in particular, developed rapidly as people became increasingly cash and time rich compared to earlier generations. Indeed, today one can reflect on the number of sports clubs able to celebrate their centenaries at this time.

Formation of the The East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association

The East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association was formed in 1905 and included clubs from the Counties of Stirling, Linlithgow, Edinburgh, Haddington, Berwick, Peebles, Selkirk and Roxburgh.

The Original sixteen clubs forming the East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association are listed below (Today 10* of these clubs can still claim East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Association membership in its centenary year)

Other tennis clubs in the area formed at that time were Bonnington (1880), Lochend (Hawkhill) (1880) and Craighall Tennis Club. These clubs merged to form Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1903.

The location of the above named original *Edinburgh* tennis clubs demonstrates how the game of tennis clearly benefited from the formation of the suburban patchwork that now comprises the vast majority of the current City of Edinburgh. The game was afforded general urban growth in the more spacious surroundings, in stark contrast to Edinburgh's "Old Town."

Chapter 3

The Early Years 1907-1930

On Court

In the 23 year period following Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club's inception in 1907, the club could boast one of its strongest playing squads in its history, helped by the merger with Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1921. The Club's players competed regularly in the closing stages of The Scottish Championships.


Miss K.E.Little was a finalist in the Scottish Ladies Singles Championship in 1919 & 1924, a Ladies Doubles semi finalist in 1913, 1919, 1923 & 1925, and Mixed Doubles semi finalist in 1922 & 1925. Miss Little was also a member of the Liberton club that won the Scottish Cup in 1925-28, considered at the time to be the strongest club side in Scotland. Reg Prophit, Sports Journalist referring to the 1922-24 East of Scotland County Ladies Team described them "an immortal team reached the British County Championship Finals, all team members were Scottish Tennis Internationalists except Miss K.E. Little."

Reg Butcher, one of the leading male players in the 1920's, and partnering **A F Currie**, also from the club, reached the 1919 semi final of the Scottish Men's Doubles Championships. Reg reached the Mixed Doubles semi final in 1921, 1923 and 1926 and went on to win the East of Scotland Open Mixed Doubles Championships in 1923 partnering **Mrs Hugh Wilson**. He also won the Scottish Men's Doubles Veteran's title in 1932 partnering **A.W. Banks** (Murrayfield). In addition to being a fine tennis player, **Reg** represented Scotland at Badminton winning 21 caps.



A F Currie & **J. McDonald** who had both played at Trinity Lawn Tennis Club reached the 1925 final of the Scottish Veteran Men's Doubles Championship.

Alex K.Allan lost to J.S. Pringle in the 1923 Scottish Boy's Singles semi final.

Other club players to feature in the Scottish Championships in this era, played at various locations including Powderhall, Ravelston and in 1926 on the specially laid grass courts at the Murrayfield International Rugby Stadium were Miss E. E. Little, Miss M. B. Allan, Miss E. Allan, Miss E. R. Allan, Miss A. C. Ross, J. Waugh, D. C. Osbourne. R. Shearer, H. J. Newlands, C R O Morrison, J. G. Macauley, Mrs Galloway, and Miss C.H. Bucher.

Butcher, Duncan and Fergus all featured in winning East of Scotland and Scotlish Titles in the 1920's and 30's. **Miss Duncan** & **Miss Fergus** were members of the Liberton club ladies team, together with the our own **K.E.Little**.

The oldest newspaper report we have uncovered from 1912 confirms a 5 sets to 4 victory in a league match for Lomond Park men's team versus Waverley with the club represented by **D.R. Davidson, H.S. Davidson, H. Morrison, J. Laing, A.E. Horsfield and K. MacKenzie**.

H.S. Davidson won the 1914 East of Scotland Gentleman's Singles First Class Handicap.

Club Championships

Men's Singles Championships were first recorded in 1909 and **David S. Crawford**, the club President in 1912, celebrated back to back Mens Singles Championship Titles in 1909-10, and then donated the present Men's Championship Cup to the club. Several male players dominated the club's championships. **Reg Butcher** won the club's Men's singles title seven times between 1919 - 1927 with a straight run of five title successes 1923-1927 and with similar success **A F Currie** and **Sydney Herald** won five **Men's Doubles** titles 1923 – 1929.

In 1922 Ladies East of Scotland League matches were introduced. In this year the Lomond Park Men's 1 & 11 teams donated to the **Ladies** of the club a **Singles Championship** Trophy, which is still presented today. Successive years saw the irrepressible **Miss K.E.Little** win 6 Womens Singles titles **1921-29**, including 4 straight titles wins 1921 –1924.

In **Ladies' Doubles**, **Miss K.E Little & E.E. Little** won back to back Championships in 1924-25.

In **Mixed Doubles, Reg** and wife **Mel Butcher** had four straight championship successes 1923 –1926, and **Reg** partnered **Miss C.H. Bucher** to a further championship in 1927. **Miss K. E. Little** partnered by **A. F. Currie** won three Mixed Doubles Titles 1922 -1929.

East of Scotland League Tennis

Lomond Park Men played in the second division of the East of Scotland leagues from 1911. The Trinity Club had played in division 1 prior to 1921, and on the merger of the clubs, Lomond Park was allowed to take the place of the Trinity Club in division 1 by special sanction of the E.S.L.T.A. Two teams were entered in the men's East of Scotland's leagues in 1921 and for three years from 1922-25, three teams were entered. The first team kept its place in the top division until 1929 and played for three years in the second division. The second team was top of division 2 in 1922-23. The ladies' team played in the first division for three years from 1923, after which it dropped to the second division.

The Lomond Park courts were highly regarded and used for an East of Scotland representative Mixed Doubles match against The Midlands in 1925.

Off Court Administration

Dr Kerr was the first club President, and key administrator in the club's infancy

David S. Crawford was appointed Club President in 1912, a position we believe he held for 14 years until 1926. "The History of Edinburgh Lawn Tennis Clubs" published by R.W. Forsyth Ltd in 1933, confirmed that **David** was Club President and Ranger in charge of courts for many years. The club minutes confirm that he tendered his resignation from Presidential office in 1926. **David** was Craighall Lawn Tennis Club champion, and following that club's demise, he joined Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1904. An original member of Lomond Park Tennis Club, he served Lomond Park & East of Scotland tennis over a number of years. In recognition of his service to the club, he was made an Honorary Life Member in 1926 and presented with a silver cigarette lighter.

J. McDonald and **A. F. Currie**, who had both joined Lomond Park from the Trinity Lawn Tennis Club, served the club well. **J. McDonald** acted as honorary club secretary for five years 1925-1929 and in addition to his successes on court, **A.F. Currie** was elected East of Scotland President 1925-26, and a representative on SLTA 1920, and in 1926.

In 1928, **H. Hamilton Beattie**, a past Singles Champion of Bonnington & Trinity Lawn Tennis clubs, President of Lomond Park 1926-28, in failing health with regret resigned from Presidential office & made an Honorary Life Member.


Club Colours (1928)

The Club Blazer colour as White and Navy Blue with a binding of blue, yellow and white, and club initials on the pocket in blue and yellow.

Club Records and Fundraising Bazaar

The club records in the earlier years reflect the formality of the time. An advertising leaflet publicising a fund raising Bazaar in 1908, recorded the full names of the Club Patrons and Committee and was held over two days at a hall in Ferry Road.

The early minute books are meticulous and committee meetings occurred far more formally and frequently than is the case today. The minute books prior to 1925 are not available, however a minute of 6 March 1925 sanctions the Secretary to destroy the old correspondence that is of no further use! Post cards were printed and used to notify members of team selection by post.




The Cash Book from 1915

As an indication of the practices and values at the time, the club in 1915 had a bank balance of £ 41 -9 / 9 and Senior subscriptions were a guinea (£ 1-1-0) and members additionally paid 5 /- to the tea fund and 5 /- to the ball fund with Juniors paying 16 /-. Recycling was fashionable even then, and a dozen old tennis balls were sold to members for 3/6. Tennis balls were supplied by the Sports Retailer "Thorntons" and new tennis balls cost £ 4-2 /6 for 6 dozen.

J Allan the Groundsman received £ 2 - 10 /- per week.

Juniors members played tennis on two grass courts at the Zetland Place/ Stirling Road corner of Lomond Park between 1923-1935. Over the years the rent charged by the Lomond Park Company for the use of these grass courts was debated at length, with a **Miss Williamson** paying the £4-4/- rent per annum on behalf of the junior section. St Serfs School rented the grass courts for a number of years which helped defray maintenance costs. Grass court use had not been without complaint from park users, and claims of "annoyance to the users of the putting course from stray tennis balls driven from the tennis courts" led to a suggestion that higher netting was required. An increase in rent to £65/- in 1935 brought an end to grass court play on economic grounds.

With the club having a healthy membership following the amalgamation with the Trinity club, membership was restricted to 160. A membership waiting list was formed and a complex Preference joining system introduced. Junior members were required to produce birth certificates, to certify age qualification. 1927 saw the introduction of lead lines on the courts and this may have replaced lime paint lines on the red blaes surface and help towards reducing the maintenance cost. The following year, 1928, a Pavilion extension (believed to be the kitchen and tearoom area) was completed at a cost of £ 150.

Maintenance of the five blaes court surfaces and two grass courts must have been a most demanding task with limited equipment. The club had been fortunate to employ loyal and committed grounds-men over the years. **James Skea** was employed 1922-1926 and was described as "such an efficient and faithful servant" and was paid £ 3-5/- shillings per week. A second groundsman was also employed to assist **Mr Skea** prepare the courts for the start of the season. Mr Skea's service to the club was recognised and when he announced in 1926 that he was emigrating to Australia, a testimonial and silver collection raised £12 10/- in treasury notes and he was also presented with a clock. Mr Skea's successor, **Adam L. Thomson** was likewise highly regarded.

Lady Members' Tea Duties

Club bye-laws were published in 1928 and rule 12 may raise a few equality issues in today's terms: "Tea is provided for members on Saturday afternoons and for the teams on home match days. The tea is prepared and dispensed by the Lady members and it is an obligation on the part of every lady member to take her share in this work". This was further amended in 1936 and some may argue worsened the position as "Any lady member who does not wish to take a Tea Day as required in the rules (Bye-law 12) must remit 5/- extra to the treasurer along with her subscription".

The Heavy Price of World War 1

Lomond Park club members who lost their lives during World War One are listed below. The loss of life was considerable, and should be viewed in the context of a club that had a total membership of 160, of which approximately 100 were male.

Napier Armit

1880-1916

Awarded the Military Cross



CAPTAIN, 16th ROYAL SCOTS

Born in Broughty Ferry to salvage engineer Thomas Napier Armit and Mary Ann Armit, Armit was educated at George Watson's College in Edinburgh.

After Watson's College, Armit studied law at Edinburgh University between 1901 and 1903. He was a Bar Apprentice with Beveridge, Sutherland and Smith WS, and was admitted to the Faculty of Advocates in March 1904. In the 1911 Census he was lodging with another Advocate at 11 Castle Street, Edinburgh – a brief walk from Parliament Square.

Following the outbreak of war, he joined the 16th ("McCrae's") Battalion, Royal Scots in December 1914. The battalion had been formed in November by Lt-Col George McCrae. Initially a Private, within a month Armit was a Second Lieutenant and by the time of his death he had been promoted to Captain. He was the editor of a battalion newspaper called "The Weakly Rumour". McCrae's

Battalion trained in Ripon from 29 May 1915. McCrae's had a fair smattering of lawyers; seven solicitors in the ranks, and eight with legal occupations among the officers, Armit and Alexander Brown being the only Advocates.

However, before he embarked for France, Armit returned to Edinburgh for a most important event. At the age of 35, he married 29-year-old Jennie Mackie, whose father was the ship owner, Sir Richard Mackie. The wedding took place at the Mackie house at Trinity Grove, Trinity Road, Leith; his address was given as "Royal Scots Camp, Ripon".

After a brief honeymoon, he returned to Ripon and on 8 January 1916 sailed from Southampton to Le Havre. The travails of McCrae's Battalion are well documented in Jack 10, Alexander's excellent book, but the Battalion's most bloody encounter of the war was to be at the Battle of the Somme. Armit was in command of a Company of the Battalion on the first day of the Battle on 1st July 1916, and succeeded in capturing the fourth line of the German trenches, thus achieving the objective set. The next day he won his Military Cross leading a bombing attack at Scots Redoubt.

The Somme Battle rumbled on despite the horrific losses on the first day, but on 4th August 1916 Armit was killed in action while leading "B" Company on an attack on a German position with the mundane name of Intermediate Trench, just north of Bazentin-le-petit. To quote from Alexander's book, "At 0451 the whistles blew. Both companies climbed over the parapet and advanced 30 paces. At that point the machine guns opened fire. Armit was on the left, leading his bombers. He got as far as the German wire, where he was shot through the head." Only one member of the company reached the objective.

Sir George McCrae selected two companies to attack Intermediate Trench; one was B Company under Captain Armit. To quote the official history of the Royal Scots – "unfortunately the plan miscarried. The Royal Scots lost their way in the darkness, and had to attack by daylight under the direct observation of the enemy machine gunners. The only officer to reach the trench was Lt. Mackenzie, who was promptly shot dead when he gained the objective." What had been a hard task became an impossible task when attempted in daylight.

Armit's name is remembered in the Advocates Library memorial, on the Thiepval Memorial on the Somme; the Grange Cricket Club memorial; and in Newhaven Parish Church.

Trinity Lawn Tennis Club History & the Merger with Lomond Park 1921

Trinity Lawn Tennis Club was formed in 1903 following the demise of Bonnington, Lochend and Craighall Tennis clubs, with members transferring to the new Trinity club. Bonnington Lawn Tennis Club had existed since the early 1880's, however the early years for tennis clubs were difficult and the enforced winding-up of the Bonnington club and Lochend Lawn Tennis Club at Hawkhill, coincided with the announcement that the most exclusive and affluent Craighall Lawn Tennis Club was likely to fold due to lack of members.

The Ramages, the well known shipping family, and J. Inglis, the ship-builder, were all leading Craighall members, and the club's best players included David S. Crawford and A. W. Banks. The club was famous for the fact that the tennis balls were never used for more than one set. Ten Bonnington members including James Pourie, H.Hamilton Beattie, James Bruce, and J.G. Galloway, each subscribed £ 5, and the Craighall courts and other assets were purchased for £50 to form Trinity Lawn Tennis Club. The Trinity Club started with a full membership on the three hard courts at the Craighall Club based at Raimes Park which was renamed Victoria Park, Craighall Road.

The first Club Championships of the Trinity Lawn Tennis Club were held in 1904, with the former Bonnington champion, **James Pourie**, defeating a former Craighall champion **David S. Crawford**. **Pourie** retained the title the following year and again in 1907. **H. Hamilton Beattie** gained his first victory in 1906 and he subsequently won the club championship on five occasions 1908-09, 1912, 1914, and 1919. **J MacDonald** won the singles title in 1910 and 1913, being succeeded in the 1911 by **A. F. Currie**. The last Trinity club Champion, in 1920 was **W. A. Davidson**, who later became the Waverley club captain.

During the second half of its life, the Trinity Club ran two men's teams, one in the first and one in the second division of the East of Scotland Lawn Tennis Associations League competitions. The best performance of the first team was in 1919, when they tied with a strong University team at the top of division one and lost by the odd match. The second team was top of the second division in 1911 and again in 1920.

A key development in the history of Lomond Park Lawn Tennis Club was the amalgamation of the club with Trinity Lawn Tennis Club in 1921. The Trinity

Club was required to vacate their courts by the Education Authority, who owned the grounds at Victoria Park and intended using the courts for the use of Trinity Academy pupils. The Lomond Park Club had access to the land to expand its facilities, but lacked the financial resources to develop the opportunity.

The Trinity Club were extremely wealthy and transferred the balance of their reserves £561-5/11 to Lomond Park. This was a considerable sum of money in those days especially bearing in mind the relatively modest financial position of Lomond Park Club at the time. The combined club had an enviable playing strength and the improved financial position of the combined resources allowed Lomond Park to convert the three lower senior courts from tar macadam and grey ash to red blaes around 1922 and to lay new courts four and five on the upper level. In addition, the club was able to invest in a clubhouse upgrade including an extension and a new ladies room which greatly improved the accommodation required to meet the demands of the increased membership. These various extensions explain the irregular shape of the clubhouse outline to the rear of the building.

Chapter 4

The War Years 1931-1945

On Court

In its centenary year, Lomond Park remains a family club. During the War years, family involvement is strongly exemplified by the **Allan family** (**Alex K. Allan** and sisters **E. Bessie Allan** and **Maimie H. K. Allan** with **Christine M. Allan**, the daughter of **Alex**). The Allan family were a strong influence on playing standards at the club, and also supported the club as administrators over many years.

During the 1930's, the club would appear to have had strong representation in the East of Scotland Championships, which at that time were held at Merchiston and Westhall. The men were represented by A.J.Cook, W (Bill) F G Lord, Alex K. Allan, W. D. McNaughton, P. P.Jackson, H. L. Roxburgh, C. F. Robertson, D. Craigie Pringle, G. S. P. Bain and A E Bromfield, and the ladies were represented by Miss Maimie H K. Allan. Miss C. Wright, Mrs R. Kenyon Letts, Miss E. L. Thomson and Miss A. C. Ross. There were a number of notable performances in the East of Scotland Men's Singles Championships, with H. L Roxburgh reaching the third round in 1932 and in 1938, A. E. Bromfield reached the third round and D. Craigie Pringle reached the fourth round of the Championships. A. F. Currie, Alex K Allan and Sydney W B Herald all represented the Men's East of Scotland County Team, with A.F. Currie captaining the side in 1930. A number of players featured in competitions out-with the club and Miss E. L. Thomson gained representative honours for the East of Scotland.

Club Championships

In **Mens Singles**, no one player dominated the period. **A.F. Currie** recorded two wins in 1930-31, **C.F. Robertson** recorded three victories in 1933, 1934 & 1937.

In Mens Doubles, M.S Stewart recorded back to back wins in 1930 & 1931, and **C.R.P.Gutteridge** recorded back to back Championship wins in 1938 & 1939.

The dominance of one player cannot be better demonstrated than by **Miss E. Bessie Allan**, who won ten **Ladies Singles** Championship Titles 1925 – 1939 including a run of five successive titles 1930-1934. During the 31 years from 1925 -1955, **Bessie** and her sister **Maimie** won 21 Ladies Singles Titles between them, with the intervention of World War 2 accounting for a further 6 years.

In **Ladies Doubles**, **Bessie Allan** won 13 Championship titles during the period 1926 -39 partnering **Miss A C Ross** on 11 consecutive years 1926-1936. The Allan sisters recorded between them 24 Ladies Doubles Championship wins over the 31 year period 1926 -1956, and including an enforced break of 6 years for the second World War, the only year when they did not win the title in this period was in 1952.

In Mixed Doubles, Maimie K.H.Allan recorded seven championship wins in a period spanning 25 years 1930-1956, on four occasions partnering Alex K. Allan and twice partnering W.F.G.Lord.

Alex K. Allan recorded 7 **Mixed Doubles** wins in a 22 years period 1930-1951, partnering **Maimie Allan** on 4 occasions, and **Bessy Allan** once.

E. Bessy Allan recorded a hatrick of Mixed Doubles Titles in 1934-39, partnering F.D.M. Williams on two occasiions.

East of Scotland Leagues

In the East of Scotland Leagues, the Men's I team returned to Division 1 status in 1933, with the second team slipping to Division 4. The Ladies team gained promotion to Division 2 in 1933 and again gained first division status in 1938. In 1939, the following team was reported in the press to have won a division one match 6-1 at Colinton (Westgarth Road): Mrs Thomson, Miss Maimie H K Allan, A J Lindsay, Mrs D. Currie, Miss Airey, Miss E. Bessie Allan. Further, the Ladies team demonstrated their competitive nature and wrote to the ESLTA complaining that in a match versus Kirkcaldy, the opposition had played with Spencer Moullion tennis balls instead of Slazenger.

Administration

A.F. Currie who had done so much for the club and Scottish Tennis served as Club President for 5 years 1930 – 34 and was later invited to become an Honorary Life Member. **James McDonald** was appointed an Honorary Life Member in 1932.

By 1933, the club membership was "full up with a waiting list" and a local newspaper reported, "One of the club's greatest assets is a junior section which has the use of grass courts in Lomond Park. During the holiday months, junior members can obtain certain playing rights on the hard courts. The juniors have a privilege on the waiting list, and this section certainly forms a most valuable recruiting ground for the club which need never fear the fate of the Craighall Club. Few Edinburgh clubs have so young a team and there is promise, as well as hope, that the place in the first division will be retained".

The Second World War Years

For the club to survive the War years required a tremendous commitment in very difficult circumstances. **A. J. Lindsay** loyally served on the club management committee for a record 19 years from 1931 – 50, serving as Honorary Secretary for 16 years from 1931-46, doubling as treasurer 1940- 46, and finally holding the office of Honorary President in 1949-50. He was presented with a gold wristwatch on his retirement and made an Honorary Life member in 1952. **Alex K. Allan** served as Honorary President 1940 – 1947 and as treasurer for 8 years 1929- 1936.

The start of conflict had an immediate impact on the club and membership fell by a third by 1940 and only the three senior courts were maintained for play. The club was saddened to receive news of the death of **Adam L.Thomson**, who had served the club loyally as grounds-man for 15 seasons from 1926 to 1941 maintaining both the red blaes and grass court surfaces.

The club minutes of the war years were a summary of changing events necessitated by the war and the hardship at the time is reflected in a note in 1942: "The wearing of 'Whites' during play will not be considered necessary until further notice. Tennis shoes must be worn." With falling income, the club struggled to make ends meet and received £30 from Granton Naval Base in 1942 for temporary memberships and welcome contributions received from Heriots Tennis Club and the "WRNS" for court use. The club was forced to sell all its Investments to remain solvent, including 3% War Stock x £ 150. Trinity Bowling club noted in July 1944, that sheep were straying onto the bowling green via the tennis courts, however with only 25 club members remaining, the very survival of the club must have been in doubt. Under Wartime regulations the Admiralty controlled Lomond Park and they let it for grazing.

The membership situation continued to deteriorate and by 1945 there were only 15 members. But for a loan of £75 from Trinity Recreation Limited, the club would in all probability have folded. Again, Heriots contributed £ 35 towards court maintenance and whiting had been reintroduced to mark the lines. (lead lines required for the war effort!)

The Tragedy of World War 2

Tragically, the club did not escape from the unpleasantness of war and several members were killed on active service.

Duncan M. Moodie was awarded the D.F.C.(Distinguished Flying Cross), R.C.A.F. He was the pilot of a Lancaster 111 JB220 and died on 18 th October 1943, aged 27, on a night mission over Hanover, Germany. He was awarded the D.F.C. posthumously and is buried in Becklingen War Cemetry, Germany.

Chapter 5

The Recovery 1946-1970

Post War Recovery Off Court

With the ending of conflict, the club gradually set about taking the first steps towards recovery. The clubhouse had suffered from neglect during the period of conflict, and chairs were purchased and general maintenance costs were much higher as the clubhouse was restored to its previous glory. The Grounds-man's weekly wage in 1947 was £ 4- 4/7 compared to an adult subscription of £ 3 3/4 and Subscriptions Revenue restored to the £400 level with 100 + 100 members.

By 1948 the club was back in surplus funds: a Garden Fete raised £167, a Bridge Drive organised by **AJ Lindsay** raised £ 26 12/-, and the Loan from Trinity Recreation Limited that had thrown the club a lifeline from insolvency was repaid in full. Formality was still the order of the day and AGM Postcards were formally printed.

By 1949, membership levels had further improved with 135 senior members and 65 juniors. Club morale had been lifted with a dance organised in the Albyn Rooms and the Ladies Team travelling to North Berwick. By 1951, the Ladies team once again travelled to North Berwick and the club subsidised the travel. The following year, the Ladies Team travel to Kirkcaldy, a journey presumably made by train or ferry, in a time before the construction of the Forth Road Bridge!

Certainly, the mid 1950's brought a return to social normality, with informal dances at the Wardie Masonic Hall and dances at the Grosvenor Hotel organised by **Tom Burns**, atended by 136 people paying 15 /- a ticket.

On Court

The players of Lomond Park displayed their talents on a broader, Scottish tennis scene. In a closely fought match at Stirling Road, Edinburgh University won the East of Scotland Regional Final of the Mens Scottish Cup in 1949, defeating Lomond Park by 7 sets to 6. **Miss D. I. Robinson** narrowly lost the 1949 Ladies Singles Title at the Nairn Championships in an energy sapping match to **Miss M Walker** (Four Courts Aberdeen) 6-0, 4-6, 14-12.

Craigie Pringle was a defeated finalist in the East of Scotland Mens Singles Championship in 1946, but won the Mens Singles Trophy in the Grantown on Spey tournament in 1950 and 1952.

Ken More, J. M Reid and Miss D. I. Robinson all represented the club in the East of Scotland Championships during the 1950's. J. M. Reid reached the fourth round of the East of Scotland Men's Singles Championship in 1950, and Miss D. I. Robinson reached the Ladies Singles third round. Alex Allan partnered Victor Woodhawks (Murrayfield) to win the Scottish Veterans Doubles Championship in 1952.



Dorothy McNeill (Sharp) joined the club as a junior, and in order to develop her tennis career joined Waverley Tennis Club. There she won the East of Scotland Girls Singles Championship in 1958-60, East Girls Doubles Title in 1957 and 1960. Dorothy went on to win the East of Scotland Ladies Singles Championship in 1965 and 1974, East Ladies Doubles Championship partnering Miss S. M. Reid in 1965, and in 1968 partnering Miss N.T. Buchanan. She also won the East Mixed Doubles Championship partnering **R. G. Shearer** in 1975. **Dorothy** is however best known as Scottish Squash Racquets International.

As an indication of the playing strength of the club at this time, **Bob Searle** first arranged in 1957 a friendly match against his old club Titwood (Glasgow), a leading Scottish Club, with a twelve players aside match. By 1959, this popular annual event was described as a grand affair followed by high tea at the Marina Hotel and a dance at the Suffolk Hotel.

The Junior section of the club in the 1950's was organised with much success by **Dorothy McDonald** (daughter of **R.M.Pentland**, Club President 1937-39).

Club Championships

Strength of individual players is once more evident during this period, **A. E.** (Ernest) Bromfield recorded four Men's Singles Championship successes in 1939 and a hat-trick of wins in 1950-52. Craigie Pringle also recorded three singles triumphs in 1938, 1947 and 1948.

From 1957, the **Men's Singles Championships** reduced from five to three sets.

Maimie H. K. Allan won 11 **Ladies Singles Championships** 1938 –1953 spanning 15 years and **Margo Horne** recorded 3 straight championship wins 1958-60 with **Miss Christine Allan** recorded three Ladies Singles championship victories in 1963, 1964 and 1966.

In **Men's Doubles**, **Ken More** demonstrated complete flexibility and won 7 straight titles with various partners 1951-57, **Bob Searle** recorded five championship wins 1956 –63, including three victories partnering **Ian Forbes**. Later, **Douglas Seale** with various partners won four **Men's Doubles** titles 1964-70 and in **Mixed Doubles** he and wife, **Irene** won five titles 1963- 1970.

In Ladies Doubles, Maimie Allan celebrated 11 Championship Titles 1938-1951 spanning the World War Two years with various partners including Irene Seale (4), D Robinson (3) & M A I Lesslie (3). Irene Seale herself achieved recorded seven Ladies Doubles Titles in 1953-68 and Margo Horne partnered by E.R.Brown celebrated four championship titles in five years 1957-61.

Bill Lord, who had officiated as an umpire at the Junior East of Scotland Championships, had met and encouraged **Dorothy H McNeill** to join Lomond Park as a junior to develop her tennis. **Dorothy** won the club's **Ladies Singles Title** at Lomond Park in 1957, and later the **Mixed Doubles** partnering **Bill Lord**. **Bill** enjoyed a hat-trick of **Mixed Doubles** Championship wins in 1946, 1954 and 1957.

Douglas & Irene Seale won the Corstorphine Open Mixed Doubles in 1957 & 1960.

East of Scotland Leagues

Mens tennis at Lomond Park enjoyed a period of strength from 1956 to the early 1960's. The team gained promotion to Division 1 of the East of Scotland leagues with Ken Scobie, Ian McKenzie, Bob Searle, Willie Reed, Ken More, John Topping, Ron Hourston, Stewart Taylor, Dizzy Kidd, Ranald Stewart, Tom Whyte and Douglas Seale representing the club. Most of these players were home grown with no club coaching system in place.

Willie Reid, Ronald Hourston, and Ian McKenzie secured club championship titles in the period 1959-61.

School & clubmates **Stewart Taylor** & **Kenneth Scobie** were runners up in the East of Scotland Boys Doubles 1955, and reached the semi finals of the Scottish juniors in the same year. In 1956 **Kenneth Scobie** partnering **Jack Dryburgh** won the East of Scotland Boys Doubles Championship.

Stewart Taylor (1958 Club Singles Champion) was remarkable, apparently he served right handed and all other strokes left handed, smashing with both hands.

Kenneth Scobie played for East County under 21 for 4 years. He left Lomond Park to develop his tennis career, and joined Westhall, another Edinburgh club with an enviable reputation.

Once very strong clubs, both Westhall and Liberton clubs have since folded.

Ian McKenzie left Lomond Park to develop his tennis career, and joined Liberton club across the city, at the time one of the strongest clubs in Scotland, and there **Ian** was a member of a Scottish Cup winning side, played East of Scotland County tennis from 1958-72 and is a member of the GB Vets team.

Sanctity of the Sabbath

To meet the demands of members, the club had unsuccessfully applied in 1947, and again in 1948, to Trinity Recreation Limited to be allowed to play on a Sunday. Community views on the Sanctity of the Sabbath in the post War period were held high. Remaining a contentious issue in 1951, the committee agreed that if Sunday tennis was to be allowed, play should not start before 2.30 pm in the afternoon, and that junior members of the club should not be allowed access to that club on that day. It was agreed that the Trinity Recreation club should again be approached on this subject and that as much force as possible should be put on securing the introduction of the Sunday play proposals for the long term interests of the club. Circulars distributed in connection with the Sunday Play debate cost 9 / 4 and were described as "Expenses of Protest circular".

By 1952, feelings regarding Sunday play were high and following a circular sent to all members that was overwhelming supported, it was decided to allow Sunday play between 2-6 pm from 14 March 1952. The club *informed* "TRC" and The Lomond Park Company of their decision and "TRC" threatened to evict the tennis club if play continued on Sundays. Following protracted discussion, Sunday Tennis would be permitted from March 1955 from the hours of 2 to 6 pm and Juniors were allowed to play on the top 2 courts after 6 pm if not required by seniors.

The Administrators

Bill Lord, a great administrator and keen player served as President 1953-55, a role he was again to be called upon to take in 1974-76. He was made an Honorary Life Member in 1958. **Craigie Pringle** who had associations with the Barnton Park club officiated at Wimbledon as a linesman in the 1950 and 1960's. He also went on to serve as East of Scotland President in 1957 – 58 and elected a member of the SLTA. **Ken More**, in addition to his on court exploits, held the office of Honorary Treasurer 1950-54., In 1955, **Mr S. L. Robertson**, a past President was made an Honorary Life Member.

Controversially in 1959, the club treasurer resigned following an alleged shortage of £3, which on investigation rose to £22.

The club's ESLTA Affiliation fee of £13 was 4 times a Senior Subscription compared to the present level which is 30 times a Senior Subscription! The ESLTA announced that it intended to hold a closed door discussion regarding a plan to reorganise the leagues however Lomond Park objected and asked for a Special General Meeting seconded by near neighbours St Serfs Tennis Club.

A.C Wheeler from the club served as East of Scotland Treasurer 1950-55.

The Sixties - A Period of Difficulty

At the AGM in 1960 the financial position of the club was described as disastrous, due to a fall in membership, a problem faced by several clubs at the time. A number of initiatives were explored to increase membership including an invitation to the National Commercial Bank staff club to join and twenty five members of the near-by engineering firm "Bruce Peebles" joined the club. Fund raising through a Derby draw, raffle, and club dance was undertaken.

During this difficult period, the club was grateful to a number of members and without their efforts and enthusiasm the club would surely have folded. Most notable members at this time include:-

R. L. (Bob) Searle served as Honorary President for 6 years 1961-66, and chaired a most important meeting held on 27 February 1962 when the future of the club was discussed.

Freda J. Walker served as Secretary for 6 years 1961 –66

John M. Miller served as Match Secretary 1963-66 and President 1967-68.

Douglas J. Seale served in a number of roles, Match Secretary 1956, Court Ranger 1963-65, Match Secretary 1968-71, and finally President 1969-71.

Both Trinity Bowling Club and Lomond Park Tennis club were experiencing financial hardship and in 1966, one of the oldest tennis clubs in Edinburgh, the nearby Inverleith Lawn Tennis club formed in 1880, proposed that they amalgamate with Lomond Park. Following discussions, the Inverleith club decide to merge with the Dyvours Grange club in Stockbridge. With almost no reserves in the bank, the Lomond Park clubhouse suffered from vandalism and membership numbers had fallen to 43 senior and 44 junior members.

Nonetheless, despite the financial difficulties, discipline and formality are the order of the day and a rule is introduced in 1968 regarding the taking of tea on Saturday and Sundays: "a bell will be rung and all courts to be vacated for a period of 15 minutes during which tea will be served in the Pavilion".

Further, the club minutes note that "Ball boys" are to be coached for Senior Finals day (no mention of girls)

Chapter 6

The Coming of Age 1971-2006

Survival of The Lomond Park Company Limited

1973 saw what was thought to be at the time an imminent threat to the survival of The Lomond Park Company Ltd. The Scotsman Newspaper dated 6th April reported that a shareholder, **Mr J Beatson**, considered the Park "had been allowed to deteriorate under the present board and that the company was losing money..."I only want to see the park is either put in good order or if the shareholders don't want that, to have it sold to a builder who would undertake a suitable type of development."

The LPC Chairman, **Mr H C Hendry** sent a circular to all shareholders pointing out that the Company Constitution did not allow for Property Development and its continued use for recreational purposes would protect house prices in the immediate area by ensuring high amenity. The matter was laid to rest!

John Brindle writes: (The Seventies on the Brink of the Abyss)

When I started playing East District League tennis for Kirkcaldy in the nineteen fifties, Lomond Park was a name to be contended with; its Men's' team having a particularly strong reputation. However, by the time I moved into Lomond Road in 1974 there had been a sad decline. I was encouraged to join Lomond Park by my next door neighbour, John Dale, and soon discovered that much was expected of the seventy or so members at that time.

The courts were red blaes and there was no play in the winter as soon as the first frost lifted the lines. When spring came a huge effort was required to get the courts into condition for the season. This was usually frustrated by the weather because the top surface was very unstable in the wet. A lorry load of five tons of new top dressing would appear and twenty sacks of new blaes were scattered on each court and then they had to be brushed and rolled to get an even playing surface. Then the fun began as the lines had to be re-laid requiring an exercise in Pythagorean geometry. Each line then had to be nailed with bucketfuls of nails, much to the amusement of the old ladies in Viewpoint, and of course those

who engaged in this task were accused for the rest of the season of not putting the nails down straight!

The committee led by **Bill Lord** began to address the problem of the declining membership. At the time squash was in the ascendant and the first proposal was to add two squash courts at the back of the ladies changing room. With the invaluable benefit of hindsight it was perhaps fortunate that this was rejected by the membership. The problems however remained and the condition of the courts and the fencing was causing concern. The top two courts, invariably referred to as the Junior courts, had a poor surface with clinker coming up through them, hardly a promising surface for aspiring new players. The problem was cost as it was expected that it would cost £46,500 to replace all the courts.

A crisis meeting was held in 1980 when various options were put to the members, one of which was for the Club to go out of existence as well as various permutations of relaying the courts in stages. The meeting agreed that the only solution was to go for broke. The problem then was how to get there. There were a number of positives. Despite the costs of having a grounds-man to brush and roll the courts, finances were prudently managed; latterly by Cynthia Bull. The Scottish Sports Council and Edinburgh Corporation were approached and grants of £12,000 and £6,000 respectively were offered.

The social life of the club revolved around fund raising efforts. The annual coffee morning in May had been essential for years to balance the books and it took on a new importance. Horse race nights were organised using a course marked out on the courts with dice for the riders moves and even a water jump much loved by Donald Allan. There was still a formidable funding gap but the members had agreed to a levy of one years subscription and Roger Miller offered a generous loan with smaller loans from the committee to make up the balance. Trinity Recreation Club was extremely supportive and actually signed the contract as the contractor wanted to deal with an incorporated body. Captain Forbes, Stanley Gray and Peter Whyte all played a very positive role.

The end result of investment in the club was well worth it and the new courts were inaugurated with an invitation tournament to all the Edinburgh clubs in August 1982. Provision was made for floodlighting in 1983 and soon the benefits were apparent in an all the year round playing season and much better facilities for Juniors. The Saturday morning Nippers who began to play then

are now the old men of the First team! There was a boom in membership, which reached nearly 550 in 1994; and the combination of increased membership and savings on maintenance transformed the clubs finances.

Squash and All Weather Court Project 1978

As mentioned by **John Brindle** above, the possibility of introducing squash courts was considered yet abandoned in the summer of 1980, in an attempt to improve the membership of the club. Another project which was aired, involved the introduction of all weather court surfaces. Indeed, in consideration of these issues the sub committee was led by **Michael Pentland**, the then Tennis Club President and a former University "Squash Blue", **Cynthia Bull** (Treasurer), **Anne Miller**, **Tony Hart** (Technical Co-ordinator), and **Ronnie Sloan** (Financial Co-ordinator).

Cynthia Bull served as Treasurer for nine years 1972-80 during the funding of the first all weather courts.

The sub committee worked tirelessly on the project but following a lower than expected expression of interest by tennis club members, it was decided that the squash project was not sufficiently viable, by which time the possibility of all weather courts had been investigated and approved. The decision to lay Synthetic Elastosol All Weather Courts, the adversity in which the club found itself, had the effect of galvanising the membership, playing standards improved and most importantly the Fund raising and Social events brought the club membership together.

An adventurous Finance Package was tailored to meet the Cost of Resurfacing all five courts \pounds 46,500:

There was a double subscription levied in 1982 and members were invited to subscribe for Repayable Bonds of £ 25 each and £ 6,750 was raised from this source. The Club was most fortunate to receive an Interest Free Loan of £ 6,000 from a local Trinity resident, **Roger Miller.**

The courts were laid by Charles Lawrence Ltd in the Spring of 1982 and 18 Mixed Couples representing clubs in the East of Scotland were invited to an Opening Tournament on 7^{th} August 1982 which was won by Blackhall Lawn Tennis club. More improvements to the club came later in 1983 with the installation of Floodlights on Court No 1 and 2 at a cost of £ 4,000.

A Social Committee, led by **Joyce Campbell** was appointed, and during the next few years many people would be involved in the organisation of fund raising and Social events in order to make loan repayments. The Fund Raising Effort was nothing short of incredible with members organising and helping in any way they could.

The Coffee Morning held in May each year became an important fund raiser for the club and regularly raised over £ 500, A Filmed Derby Race night was held in St Serfs Scout Hall, a sponsored cycle to Gullane raised £ 270, in what were appalling conditions for the return leg, with driving rain from the west. Only a stop at Luca's Ice Cream shop in Musselburgh allowed a gathering of energy for the last 8 miles home. Other events included a Car treasure hunt, and a Progressive meal and a Childrens' sponsored walk,

Not of course forgetting the Jumble Sale at Portobello Town Hall which raised £ 195, when the enthusiastic **David Fairbairn** took off his jersey, and another stall holder sold it by mistake!

Under **Michael Pentland's** Presidency (1977–1981), the club had moved from a most perilous state to one of a thriving organisation with a solid financial base. To mark his retiral from office and marking his long association with the club, Michael presented a Challenge Cup for Junior Girls, which is still presented today. Further, in 2005, **Michael Pentland** was invited to become an **Honorary Life Member** of the club following 25 years service as honorary club auditor.

The speed at which the club had been able to pay off its debts must have surprised even **Michael Pentland**. The Loan from **Roger Miller** £ 6,000 was repaid in full in 1985, LTA Loan £ 5,000 repaid in 1986 and Members Bonds £ 6,750 were repaid by a ballot system with the final amount paid back in 1987.

Court Resurfacing 21 mm Artificial Grass Carpet 1991 and Practice Wall

The 1982 Elastocol Rubber crumb surface, was replaced in 1991 with a Desso Sportilan 21 mm Artificial Grass carpet. The court was laid by E.R.D.C. Ltd at a cost of £ 49,575. This proved a good investment with the carpet performing well over the next 11 years. The Club's financial position was now much stronger, the project funded by £ 20,000 from reserves, £ 18,000 6 year LTA Loan guaranteed by 20 club members, repaid within a year (much to the relief of guarantors), and a £ 12,000 Grant from "The Foundation of Sports & the Arts".



The new courts coincided with the building of a tennis practice wall costing £ 2,370, part funded by a £1,500 Scottish Sports Council Grant. Park railing sections in Lomond Road were removed to protect the park surface from the weight of the Concrete Mixer. Scaffold poles which were to form a frame for netting round the practice wall were stolen from inside the club grounds.

Court Replacement Artificial Grass Court Surface 15 mm (2002)

In 2002, the Artificial sand filled Grass Court Surface was replaced on all 5 courts with a shorter 15 mm pile carpet laid by Charles Lawrence Surfaces Limited at a cost of \pounds 49,000, funded from accumulated reserves.

The Court Surface which had initially played well, soon became extremely dangerous. The carpet fibres were bending, the sand lying on top of the fibres, creating a slippery surface. A 12 month protracted negotiation with the contractors, proved difficult. The carpet fibres were supplied by a chemical firm in Belgium, the carpet itself manufactured in Yorkshire and the firm that laid the courts Charles Lawrence Surfaces Ltd had sold their business. The LTA Technical Department supported the club with a site visit, the facts were established, and the courts replaced in 2006, the club contributing £ 17,625 towards fair wear and tear. Completion of this project was delayed when a 13 metre role of carpet was stolen from the grounds. Directors of Charles Lawrence Surfaces Ltd, Sir Charles Lawrence and David Blamire, were extremely helpful in supporting the club through the complex commercial issues, with Clive Garlick and Bob Adams representing the club throughout the project.

In 2007, the club invested in a tractor and brush implement at a \pounds 3,200 cost, the main benefit of which was reduced groundsman time, application of consistant brush pressure during the brushing process, and maintain best court condition.

David Warner was appointed grounds-man in March 1994, and over the next 12 years **David** maintained the courts and grounds to a high standard, with the Lomond Park courts being set aside as "stand by" courts for the Scottish Championships in 1995 and 1998 in the event that rain affected play at the Dyvours Grass Courts in Stockbridge.

On Court - Junior Tennis Development

Towards the end of the 1980's, the junior club coaching programme run by **Trish Brindle, Angela Horsfall, Margo Croan, Susan Brown** and others began to bear fruit and the profile of Junior tennis at Lomond Park was raised:-

The Boys under 18 team won the division one league title in 1986, 1989, 1990, and the Boys under 14 team won the division one title 1987 and 1988. Not to be outdone the Girls under 18 team won the Division One Title in 1996 and 1997.

There were personal successes for **Hamish McGregor** and **Lorn Lawson** in 1987 and 1988 at the Dunfermline Open tournament. Meanwhile in 1988, **Jamie Petrie** won the East Lothian Championships under 14 Boys Singles and **Lorn Lawson** was runner up in the National Parks under 18 Boys singles and the following year **Jamie Petrie** won the Edinburgh and Scottish National Parks under 18 Boys Singles tournament and went on to compete in the British National Parks U18 event where he was a semi finalist.

In 1990, **Jonathan Guy** won the Dunfermline under 12 boys doubles partnering **Neil Dickson** from Duffus and with partner, **Jonathan** was a runner up in the Scottish Grass Courts under 12 doubles. In 1992, **Jonathon** won the Scottish Championships under 14 Boys Doubles partnering **Suyogi Jigajinni** (Thistle).

The Dunfermline Junior event proved a popular venue for Lomond Park juniors where **Jonathan Guy** and **Richard Horsfall** registered success in both singles and doubles in 1991. **Rory Allan** represented Scotland in the under 12 age group in an International against Wales and went on to win the Mortonhall under 10 boys tournament and win the East Boys Doubles under 12 partnering **J. Collins**.

Jill McIntyre joined the girls junior coaching team at the club with some success.



In 1995, Jill's daughter Alison McIntyre and Gillian Fraser won the under 16 girls doubles at North Berwick and in 1996 Gillian Fraser won the East of Scotland Closed Championship under 16 girls singles played at Lomond Park and she and Pamela Fraser reached the girls under 18 doubles final. The following year, Alison McIntyre won the East of Scotland Closed Girls under 16 Doubles again hosted at Lomond Park.

Will Henderson and Michael Ross reached the semi final of the 1998 East of Scotland Closed Tournament under 16 boys' doubles. In the same year Pamela Fraser reached the final of the under 18 mixed doubles and Zoe Cullen and Pamela Fraser reached the final of the under 18 girls doubles at the Dunfermline tournament.

In the **Junior Championships**, the stand out performances were in the Boy's singles under 18 where **Alastair Randall** recorded 4 straight wins 1982-85 and in the Girls under 18, **Alison Brodie** recorded 4 titles 1989-91. Later in 2004, the keenly contested final of the Boys under 18 Championship between **Ross Macrae** and **Chris Law** lasted over 3 hours, and the umpire **Simon Goldsmith** had to be sustained during the match with food and refreshments from the BBQ. The umpire was none the worse for his experience, however the finalists were reported to be "very tired" a number of days later.

In the centenary year, the club is running eight age group junior sides supported with a Professional coaching and development programme.

On Court - Seniors

The new playing surface promoted and encouraged higher levels of performance. The club recorded Tournament success in 1983 with **Ian Henderson** and **Mrs A Mitchell** winning the East of Scotland Restricted Mixed Doubles. **Ann Mitchell** then went on to partner **Mrs M Rennie** as a runner up in the East Restricted Ladies Doubles and **Ian Henderson** and **Mrs Ann Mitchell** winning the Pringle Cup, the first time that Lomond Park had won this event.

Bill Aspin launched the club's own internet website "lomondparktennis.com" in 2002. **Bill** also used his artistic skills to draw the sketch of the clubhouse appearing on page 2 of this book. **Ian Campbell** who held the joint positions of Match Secretary and Web-Master, first used the club's website in 2003 to publish the club championship draws and updated results over the internet during the tournament.

East of Scotland Leagues

The improvement in playing surface and the clubs focus on junior coaching contributed to the general improvement in playing standard.

In 1974, with falling membership numbers, the men ran two teams with the Men's first team playing in Division 7. By 1981 the Men's first team had climbed to Division 4 and gradually standards improved. In 2004, all three men's teams were promoted with the senior side led by **Hamish McGregor** gaining promotion to Division 1 (the first time a senior Lomond Park side had achieved Division One status since the late 1950's – a tremendous effort!). The squad included **Hamish McGregor**, **Martin Hendrie** (the club's professional coach), **Ian Campbell**, **Clive Hembury**, **David McCall**, **Jamie Petrie**, **Charles Robertson**, **Andrew Thomson**, **Howard Pether** and **Richard Horsfall**, with over half of the squad coming through the club's own coaching programme from junior level.

The Men's second team had languished in Division 7 in 1981 and they too improved in stature to reach Division 3 status by 2005.

The overall improvement in the standard of Men's play, resulted in a third team being formed in 1994 with a blend of experienced and junior players, and this team gained league promotion in three successive seasons 1995-97, winning 24 out of 28 matches.

The Ladies First team had played consistently in Division 4 prior to 1981, and they too had shown improvement in standard and had reached Division 2 standard by 2006. The Lomond Park Ladies first team who had never won a league title in 25 years 1981-2005 brought the famine to an end by winning the Division 3 Title in 2005.

The Ladies Second Team have played fairly consistently in Division 5 1981-2006 and perhaps encouraged by the success of the Men's third team, the Ladies formed a third team in 1997, and they too enjoyed success, starting in Division 9 and reaching Division 6 level by 2005. A ladies fourth team was launched in 2006.

Margaret Main partnering **Andrew Thompson** were defeated Pringle Cup finalists in 2006.

Ronnie Sloan served on the East of Scotland Committee from 1982-84 and is attributed with the Lomond Park song which was published in the E.S.L.T.A Brochure on launching the clubs floodlights.(see back page of book).

Administration

As the club prospered, and membership levels increased, so too did the demand for more teams for both seniors, juniors and veterans and there was a clear focus on professional coaching and a requirement for the club to compete with the commercially operated tennis and sports centres.

As early as 1992, there had been discussion with "TRC" and Trinity Bowling Club regarding the setting up of a "Sinking Fund Reserve" to provide against any future financial difficulties of either club or to provide for the replacement of the clubhouse. After considerable and lengthy debate, all parties agreed that it would be prudent for both clubs to set aside a fixed sum annually towards a "contingency reserve".

The provision of a first class all year round playing facility attracted a record membership of 548 in 1994 and resulted in the introduction of coloured shoe tagging to control membership. Such was the demand for all year round play, that the club extended court floodlighting to Courts 3, 4 and 5 at a cost of £ 9,000. Progress on court was met with the age long problem and challenge of security of the Clubhouse and Grounds, with money being stolen from the floodlight meters and vandalism and youths causing problems from the park.

From SLTA published club membership data in 1993, Lomond Park reported membership levels were in the **top 10** of all Scottish Tennis clubs.

Clubhouse Refurbishment

In 2004, under the project management of **Adrian Capaldi, Hamish McGregor** and **Cath Macrae**, the clubhouse was refurbished at a cost of £15,000 with the replacement of floor joists in the main clubhouse, refurbishment of the kitchen area and changing rooms adding personal locker space, rewiring throughout and redecoration both internally and external including painting, floor sanding and provision of furniture.





The following year, **Margo Croan**, who had previously served the club as Secretary and been involved in the successful junior coaching programme, was elected Honorary Club President, the Second Lady President in Club History.

However the club's success over the years relied on many members giving of their free time as unsung ambassadors and loyal supporters of the club. It is impossible to name everyone or to recognise the contributions made, however without the volunteers there would be no club.

Off Court

From the mid 1980's to date, two prominent features of the club social calendar have been the junior finals day BBQ which has always been well attended and the club's annual 20 overs per side cricket match against the "Woodcutters XI" played at Bangholm Playing Field. The Lomond Park XI invariably captained by Sinclair Campbell or Charles Robertson were fortunate to be able to call on Fraser Dall, Donald Allan, Rob Blair, Richard Horsfall and the bravest of wicket keepers Kerr Petrie. For this ageing side, it is fortunate that the club has always been able to unearth some aspiring and hitherto hidden talent from the junior ranks for some fast running between the wickets.

In a challenge football match in 1984 organised by **Glen Ross**, his football skills were put to the test as he led a Lomond Park "All Star" XI against Waverley Tennis Club in a match played at the most challenging of venues, "The Jack Kane Centre". Some Lomond Park team members had been encouraged to come out of retirement in an attempt to turn back the clock, and by half time several wished they had not bothered as the team lost by six goals to one.

Wooden Tennis Rackets



Wooden tennis rackets with cat gut strings were replaced in the 1980's with tennis racket frames made from composite materials including carbon fibre, graphite, fibreglass or titanium alloys and the strings made of synthetic material including polymide and other polymers.

The new rackets had a larger head area, and were said to have a larger sweet spot, providing more power and accuracy. One brand of wooden framed tennis racket highly regarded was the "Dunlop Maxply Fort" as seen in the photograph.

Trinity Bowling Club

Over the past century, through Trinity Recreation Limited, the tennis and bowling club have worked side by side and in recent years, leading members of Lomond Park Tennis Club have gone on to hold office in Trinity Bowling Club:-

Kerr Petrie who was Honorary President of the tennis club in 2000-01, was Trinity Bowling Club Singles Champion in 1991 and went on to become Honorary President of the bowling club in 1995

Sinclair Campbell was Honorary President of the bowling club in 2006, Honorary President of the tennis club in 1988-1990 and Club Champion at bowling in 2000 and 2004 and a tennis doubles Champion on various occasions.

Ken Campbell was appointed Vice President of the bowling club in 2006, having served as a Director of Trinity Recreation Limited for many years and acted as Honorary Treasurer for the tennis club 1987-89.

Clive Garlick, Tennis Club President represented the club at the 150th anniversary celebrations of Trinity Bowling Club in 2005.

Chapter 8

Second Century Challenges – A period of Records (2008 -2020)

Entering the Second Century

With the succesful Club Centenary Celebrations a distant memory, the club embarked on the challenges of a new century. Lomond Park is proud to retain the position as one of the largest membership clubs in Scottish Tennis. Keeping pace with members expectations, the club can boast a new artificial grass court surface, a refurbished clubhouse, membership levels in the period 2008 – 2020 averaging 430, of which 230 are Adults and a thriving Junior section of around 180 members, a sound financial base secured over many years of careful fund accumulation and investment in facilities, balancing Subscription levels with value for money, and providing a mix of fun Social events. The club offers competitive team tennis in the East of Scotland leagues offerring 4 Mens teams, 4 Ladies Teams, Veterans Teams, and around 10 Junior Age Group teams for Boys and Girls. The focus on Club sponsored Professional Coaching for Juniors is popular in developing tennis talent.

By 2020, Club membership had grown to 600, as a result of the effects of the Global Pandemic Covid 19, with many working from home or furloughed, and restrictions on travel. As a result, Lomond Park became one of the largest tennis clubs in Scotland.

This was a period of club records

- Club Membership levels exceeded 600 for the first time in 2020
- Record Investment in the Court Facilities £ 121,000 in 2020
- Club Championship Victories by Hamish McGregor and Jacquie Edwards break all records
- Mens team earn promotion to Division 1 in 2019

Administration

Club Management and Constitution in the Second Century

As the club expanded and membership grew, so the need to develop a successful club management structure to meet the expectations of the membership.

The Constitution was amended in 2011 and again in 2015 to accommodate guidance and incorporate LTA Standard Provisions on governance matters, and as a result the following club management structure implemented

- Honorary President
- Honorary Vice President
- Secretary
- Treasurer
- Mens Club Captain
- Ladies Club Captain
- Junior Convenor
- ❖ Up to 6 other Committee members

The Other Committee responsibilities included

- Subscription Secretary
- Website Manager
- Social Convenor
- Club Coach

For the first time, the club employed a part time Administrator to deal with the demands of the larger membership, Website, Coaching co ordination, and Junior Tennis generally.

New 30 Year Lease Arrangements for Club

Historically, The Lomond Park Company Ltd owned the Lomond Park land, and had leased the Tennis Courts and Clubhouse through Trinity Recreation Limited who had then sub-leased the facility to the tennis club and bowling club. Whilst there had been many merits for this arrangement over the previous century, particularly in times of financial difficulty for the club, it had now been decided that for efficiency, Trinity Recreation Ltd would be wound up and the tennis

club would enter a 30 year lease of the tennis facility in its own name, directly from The Lomond Park Company Ltd commencing in 2017.

A huge amount of time was spent on the club's behalf by **Mike Polson**, **Gordon Kerr**, **Ian Harris** and **Kerr Petrie**, securing the new arrangement, for which the club are most grateful. Tennis member, **Linton Horsfall**, was involved in the dissolution arrangements for the intermediate company, Trinity Recreation Ltd which completed the process.

Website Technology

Recognising the need for improved Website presence, the club appointed **Florence Kennedy** as a Webmaster, and the technology put in place to allow members to pay their subscriptions on line for the first time in 2009. Marketing the club and its facilities through the Website would become increasingly important.

Facilities

In 2015, under the guidance of **Ian Harris**, the practice wall area at the back of the clubhouse was refurbished with a new carpet, redesigned overhead beam support and netting, tractor shed relocated and new BBQ area established.

The family of **Angela Buchanan**, donated a bench in her memory in 2015 and the club supplied a matching seat for members to enjoy.

Heart Defibrillator

In a joint project with the the bowling club, a "Heart Defrillator" was installed at the clubhouse entrance in 2016, with both club members trained in its emergency use.

Court Resurfacing 2020

The Club had planned to renew the Artificial Court Surface in 2020, (previous surface 2006) and although construction work was initially delayed due to the Covid 19 pandemic, work was able to proceed in a 6 week window through July and August.

A sub committee led by President Ian Harris, Alan Malcolm (Club Administrator) & Jamie Verhaere (Club Coach) successfully managed the project. The selected contractor, Doe Sports (North) Ltd, addressed various existing drainage issues, laid a new tarmac base on top of the original Elastosol Court Surface, providing five sand dressed artificial grass courts (DOE Mono Pro product), which will provide the truest bounce. Work included new ground level kerbing, new perimeter fencing and new Net Posts. Court 1 was also moved slightly to the west to reduce the serve receiving player contact with the hedge next to the bowling green from wide placed serves. The end result were five excellent well drained courts for members to enjoy. In addition, The Lomond Park Company Ltd supported the club by arranging for a drain to be inserted in the park across the breadth of courts 4 and 5 to deal with surface rain water from the park.

The work was carried out at a cost of £121.000, the largest investment ever made by the club in its 113 year history, funded from club reserves carefully accumulated by club committees over many years. The club was successful in applying for an £18,000 Grant from Viridor Waste Recovery, who recycled the old court carpets. Coincidentally, the club received a very welcome £25,000 Government Covid Resiliance Business Grant towards the financial impact of Covid 19 virus on the club.

In 2012 **Judith M. Law** was awarded Honorary Life Membership. **Judith** was Junior Match Secretary 1999-2004, Ladies Captain 2005-2007, Centenary Committee Member 2005-2007, Honorary President 2010-11 when the Website development was undertaken. **Judith** continues as a match team player, was the First Recipient of the Centenary Cup, and over the years **Judith** has organised many social, charity events and Wimbledon Draws. **Judith** has represented Lomond Park as a board member of ESLTA for 5 years 2007-2011. Centenary President **Margo Croan** said of **Judith**, "**Judith** is someone who can always be counted upon to be there on any occasion for the club in whatever capacity she is asked."

Ronnie K. Sloan M.B.E: Honorary Life Membership

In 2013, Ronnie K. Sloan was awarded Honorary Life Membership. At a low point in the History of the club in 1978, a Committee Chaired by Michael **Pentland**, was established to consider the viability of the club investing in the first All Weather Courts. Ronnie was Financial Convenor of this committee, and with a fairly high risk financial plan involving Grants, Repayable Member Bonds, Advance Member Subscriptions and a single Individuals generous Repayable Loan, the project was delivered with club wide participation in fund raising, for which the co-ordinated efforts of Joyce Campbell were fundamental. This was the turning point for the club as we know it today. Ronnie has represented the club on the ESLTA Board 1982-1984 and appointed Honorary Club President 1985-1987. On court, he has represented the Mens teams for many years. At the Club Centenary Celebrations, Ronnie was our star guest as "Superman", and in 2011 loaned to the club "a framed T Shirt signed by the March 2011 AEGON GB Davis Cup Team (James Ward, Alex Bogdanovic, Jamie Baker, Jamie Murray, Colin Fleming) which is displayed in the clubhouse and in 2014 he donated to the club an "Oak Role of Honour Board for Past Champions and Presidents from the 1970's".

A.Kerr Petrie: Honorary Life Membership

Kerr is the most popular, likeable and helpful of members. He has served as Club President 2000-01 and importantly supported the club over many years on

clubhouse and court maintenance tasks, always completed to a high standard and in good humour.

Ye bonny courts of Lomond Park Didn't have floodlights, they played in the dark, The courts were all red and covered in blaze Which got on your shoes, socks and claes, And also the number of members was low, It was possible that Trinity tennis would go.

About 30 years ago the cavalry arrived, Thanks to them Lomond Park tennis has survived, They raised some money and borrowed a whack, Heavy in debt there was no going back, A new playing surface was eventually laid, Floodlights were bought and foundations were made.

The club was now on a firm footing and one of these stalwarts, although he worked harder than any, was not a true tennis man at heart and preferred other sports until his children started playing the game. Encouraged by them he grew to love tennis and has graced the courts now for many years.

This person liked football and cycling for thrills, He thought tennis was only for women and girls, Till his children forced him to take up a racket, To be beaten by his kids, he just couldn't hack it, He took to the game and became a star The captain of the Laggards said 'son you'll go far'. He still plays a good game even though he's a vet, And sometimes he even wins a set. It's very commendable as I'm telling you this, The knees that he has aren't even his!

However it is for his efforts off the courts as much as those on the courts that we celebrate tonight. Our mystery person has been ever present over the years assisting the club in countless ways with maintenance, roof and ground repairs.

His background in construction and his electrical and plumbing expertise has been simply invaluable. He has always been generous with his time to assist in so many ways at both the tennis and bowling clubs.

Throughout this period, the club had 4 Mens and 4 Ladies teams and Vets teams competing in the ESLTA leagues.

The Mens 1 st team competed mainly in Division 2 or 3 during the period. Their fortunes improved in 2018 when the Mens 1st, 2 nd & and 3rd team all gained promotion.

The Mens 2nd team played in division 4 to 6, Mens 3 rd team in Division 5 to 7 and Mens 4 th team in Division 8 or 9. In most years the club utilised 50 players to support the 4 Mens teams.

This is the best cup run the club has enjoyed since the late 1950's.

Club Championships

In Club Championships during this period, the club had two outstanding records to celebrate.

Hamish P. McGregor recorded 43 Championship victories, more than any other player in the 113 year history of the club. Spanning a 23 year period, 1988-2011, **Hamish** recorded 15 Singles Titles, 15 Mens Doubles Titles and 13 Mixed Doubles Titles. A truly excellent record.

Jacquie Edwards, recorded 39 Championship victories, second only to **Hamish** in the history of the club, with 17 Singles Titles, 10 Doubles Titles and 12 Mixed Doubles Titles. This was achieved over a 30 year period from 1989 to 2018, this is the longest span of Championships won by anyone in the club history, demonstrating a commendable and sustained level of fitness and tennis quality. Of special mention is a consecutive run of 11 Singles Titles from 2008 to 2018.

Over the years these athletes have been managed by Ian Harris, David Law, Mike Polson and Gordon Kerr.

Coronavirus Covid 19

Year 2020 will be memorable for the Coronavirus Covid 19 Global Pandemic. Government Restrictions to contain the spread of the respiratory virus resulted in no tennis being able to be played from late March until the end of June. Restrictions then followed on play, involving player hand sanitization before and after play, and latterly singles play only to reduce possible player contact and virus transfer. All Summer East of Scotland Leagues were cancelled and the Club was unable to hold their Annual Championships. There was an attempt to play a shortened form of inter club team tennis in September, with tennis play only with with no social teas afterwards.

During the Autumn easing of Covid19 restrictions, **Adrian Capaldi** organised within the club monthly box leagues for singles and doubles play, with promotion and relegation and these proved very popular.

With many people furloughed and working from home during the Pandemic, interest in tennis increased.

For the first time in the clubs history, the AGM was held with members using "Zoom" video conference calling to participate in the meeting.

Obituaries

During the period 2007-2020, members of long standing passed away, they loved the tennis club, and had worked tirelessly for the cause, contributing many voluntary hours leading the club through one of the most challenging periods in its history in the late 1970's and 1980's. We owe a debt of gratitude to them and their contribution is more fully detailed elsewhere in this book.

Chapter 12

Hall of Fame (Chronological Order)

David S. Crawford

David was a founding member of Lomond Park in 1907. He had been a former Craighall Lawn Tennis Club Singles Champion and winner of the Lomond Park Men's Singles Championship in 1909 and 1910. He was certainly credited with a considerable amount of development work at Lomond Park and in the East of Scotland and, whilst the records are incomplete, it is believed he was Honorary Club President at Lomond Park for 14 years between 1912 and 1926. **David** presented the current Men's Singles Championship Cup to the club in 1912.

David also had responsibility over a number of years as the club's court ranger responsible for managing the maintenance of the courts; a major task given the court surface and equipment available. He retired from the club in 1926 and was made an Honorary Life Member.

A.F. Currie

A. F. Currie is widely acknowledged to have worked tirelessly for the game of tennis, both at club and county level. He was appointed Honorary President of the East of Scotland 1925-26, at National level served the SLTA in 1920 and 1926 and he served as Honorary President of Lomond Park for 5 years 1930-34.

Originally a member of The Trinity Club (Craighall), he won the Men's Singles title there in 1911 and, on amalgamation with Lomond Park, won the Men's Singles title at Lomond in 1930 & 1931 and Mixed Doubles Titles in 1922, 1928 & 1929. He was also Men's Doubles Champion on 6 occasions between 1923-32, 4 times partnering **Sydney W. B. Herald**.

As an indication of the strength of Lomond Park, both he and **Sydney Herald** represented the East County and he was honoured to captain the East County side in 1930. He was invited to become an Honorary Life Member in 1946.

Miss K.E.Little



Miss K. E. Little represented the East of Scotland on a number of occasions, and was the only "uncapped" player to be a member of the East of Scotland Team that played in the Final of the British Championships in 1924.

Miss Little played in many Scottish Championship semi finals and finals during the period 1913 – 1925 in both singles and doubles but appears never to have won a Scottish Championship title.

Miss Little also played for the Liberton Lawn Tennis club in 1925 –26 and won the SLTA Cup. At that time, the Liberton Ladies team were considered to be the strongest in Scotland.

In the Club Championships, **Miss Little** won the Ladies Singles Championship in 1921-1924 (no trophy before that date), and in Ladies Doubles 1924-1925, partnering her sister **Miss E. E. Little** (no trophies before 1924). In Mixed Doubles, **Miss Little** recorded three title wins during 1922-1929, partnering **A. F. Currie**

E. Reginald Butcher



Reginald Butcher was a leading player in his time and represented the East County on many occasions. In addition to being a fine tennis player, Reg was a Scottish Badminton Internationalist.

Reg regularly reached the final or semi final in the Scottish Tennis championships during 1919-1930 in both Men's and Mixed Doubles. In 1919, the Lomond Park pairing of **Reg Butcher and A. F. Currie** lost in the Scottish Men's Doubles semi final which in those days played over the best of 5 sets. He won the Scottish Open Mixed Doubles Championships in 1923 partnering **Mrs Hugh Wilson** and won the East Mixed Doubles Championship in 1926 partnering **Miss R. Welsh**. Partnering **A. W. Banks** (Murrayfield), he won the Scottish Men's Doubles Veterans Championship in 1932.

In Club Championships, he was seven times winner of the Club Men's singles title 1919- 1927, including 5 straight title wins 1923- 1927. Considering his expertise in doubles play, it is surprising that he only recorded two Men's doubles championship titles in 1922 and 1924, however this may have been influenced by the strength of his club-mates, **A. F. Currie, J. McDonald and Sydney W. B. Herald.**

He and wife **Mel** won 4 Mixed Doubles titles in successive years 1923-26 and the following year partnered, **Miss C. H. Bucher**, to championship victory.

Miss Maimie K. H. Allan (Receiving trophy from Bessie Allan)



Maimie K. H. Allan won a remarkable 29 Club Championship titles and demonstrated great consistency in winning eleven Ladies Singles Championships spanning 15 years 1938- 1955 and would probably have added to her trophy successes but for the intervention of World War Two. **Maimie** won eleven Ladies Doubles Championship Titles during 1938 – 1956 (4 partnering **Mrs I. Seale** 1953- 1956) and recorded seven Mixed Doubles Championship Titles 1930 – 1954, including 4 titles partnering her brother **Alex**. **Maimie** played in the East of Scotland Championships on a number of occasions.

Miss E. Bessie Allan (Presenting trophy to Alex Allan)



E. Bessie Allan, the sister of **Maimie**, won 26 Club Championships including ten Ladies Singles Titles 1925 –1937 spanning twelve years, and was unfortunate to play in the same era as **Miss K. E. Little**. **Miss Allan** also recorded 13 Ladies Doubles Championship victories 1926- 39 including eleven titles in successive years partnering **Miss A.C.Ross**, and 3 Mixed Doubles Titles.

Alex K. Allan

As an administrator, **Alex** served as Honorary Club President 1940-47 and Treasurer 1929-36. On court, **Alex** reached the 1923 semi final of the Scottish Boys Singles Championship where he was narrowly beaten by **J. S. Pringle**, who was later to become a member of the club. He went on to record 13 Club Championship Titles, winning the Men's Singles in 1928 and 1932, the Mixed Doubles on 7 occasions between 1930-51 partnered by sister **Maimie** 4 times, sister **Bessie** once and his wife on 2 further occasions. **Alex** won 4 Men's Doubles Titles in 1928 and 1930 and partnered his Boys Singles rival **J. S. Pringle** to victory in 1947 and 1948.

Alex partnered **Victor Woodhawks** (Murrayfield) to win the Scottish Veterans Mens Doubles Championship in 1952.

W. F. G. Lord



Bill was elected club President twice (1953 –55), and recalled to lead the club during a challenging period (1974-76). **Bill** also served as Treasurer in 1937-39.

On court, **Bill** registered two Men's Doubles Championship Titles in 1953 and 1958, 3 Mixed Doubles Victories in 1946, 1954 & 1957. **Bill** Captained the Men's team in 1953 and was made an Honorary Life member in 1958

Dorothy Liddel



A popular team member, **Dorothy** recorded total of 16 club a Championship Titles in a short 9 year period 1970-1978, including 4 Ladies Singles Titles, 6 Ladies Doubles Championships & 6 Mixed Doubles Titles partnering Gordon Chalmers including straight run of Championship victories 1971-75.

Ian G. Henderson



Ian's trademark heavy topspin forehand has helped register 17 club Championship Titles including three Men's Singles Championships 1979 – 1984, eight Men's Doubles Championships 1979-1989, partnering **Donald Allan** on three occasions in 1986, 1987 and 1989. In 1985, Ian was the reigning champion in Men's Singles, Doubles and Mixed Doubles, however his title defence came to a dramatic and abrupt end when partnering **Dr Donald Allan** in the semi final of the men's doubles and playing against a young **Hamish McGregor and Lorn Lawson**. Ian lost his footing, fell awkwardly and suffered a fractured skull. Fortunately he made a full recovery and today plays at the Hatton club where he has won the Men's Singles Title. The injury prevented Ian recording 6 straight men's double title victories. In Mixed Doubles, **Ian** recorded six Championship titles 1981-87 including a hat-trick of titles with **Margo Valentine** 1985-87.

Partnering **Mrs Ann Mitchell**, **Ian** won the Pringle Cup in 1983 for the first time in the history of the club, and later that year with **Ann** won the East Restricted Mixed Doubles Title. Further success was to follow, partnering **Margo Valentine** as **Ian** won the Craigmiller Park Open Mixed Doubles Championship in 1985.

Moira Dobbie



Moira's mother, Joyce Boothman, once attained a senior tennis ranking of no 3 in Scotland, and with the advantage of a tennis court in the back garden, there were few excuses to avoid tennis practice. As a junior, then a member of Murrayfield Tennis Club, **Moira** was selected for the Scottish age group tennis squads and represented Scotland under 14 and under 16 in the National Championships.

Moira's successes included: Scottish under 15 Singles Champion 1967, Finalist in Scottish under 18 Singles 1969, Scottish under 18 Girls Doubles Champion 1969, Finalist in the Scottish Schools Nestle Tennis Tournament and she represented Scotland in the British Schools Tournament 1969. Moira was also Under 18 Scottish Covered Courts Girls Champion 1968 and represented East of Scotland at County Level. Moira currently represents East of Scotland over 50's county level squad.

Since joining Lomond Park, **Moira** has recorded five championship wins in the Ladies Singles in 1997 – 2002, including 4 straight title wins 1997 –2000. In addition, **Moira** added six Ladies Doubles titles 1996 – 2002 with five of them partnering **Margo Valentine**, including five straight championships 1996-2000. **Moira** captained the Ladies Team in 1997-2000

Hamish P. McGregor



Hamish (l) with doubles partner Lorn Lawson (r) More Trophies to polish!

Hamish benefited from the club's Saturday morning nippers coaching under the tutelage of Trish Brindle, Angela Horsfall and Susan Brown and was selected for ESLTA junior squad coaching for 3 years. Hamish went on to win a number of the club's own junior championships and partnered Lorn Lawson in the Boys Doubles. A measure of the success of this duo, was victory in the highly rated Dunfermline under 18 Boys Doubles Tournament in 1987 and 1988. A highlight for Hamish was winning the Division 1 under 18 Boys title with Lorn Lawson, Jonathan Brindle & Ian Campbell in 1987, and in 1986 & 1987 being a member of the Stewarts Melville team that won the Scottish Schools Tennis Cup. Hamish was a member of the Stirling University team that won the Central Scotland Division 1 league title.

Hamish has achieved a record **43** club Championships, with fifteen Men's Singles Titles 1988- 2011 in 23 years, more than any other player in the club's history, fifteen Men's Doubles Titles 1990 – 2011 and eight of these victories partnering **Lorn Lawson**. In Mixed Doubles 1990 – 2011, **Hamish** recorded twelve championships with ten of these partnering **Jacquie Edwards**, including four successive titles in 1990 –93.

Hamish has confided to me that he was only promoted to the Men's I team after he partnered **Lorn** for a season in the second team undefeated and won the Men's Singles Title. Apparently the Gents selection policy was unclear at the time! Men's Doubles exponents **John Brindle**, **Sinclair Campbell** and **Ian Henderson** are attributed with helping **Hamish** take the step from Junior Champion to court-wise Senior player.

A true tennis leader and enthusiast, **Hamish** is a qualified tennis coach and captained the club for eight years during 1991- 2005, with the highlight being the Men's first team promotion into Division 1 in 2005, the first time in 50 years that a Senior club side had played in Division one. Off court **Hamish** comanaged the Clubhouse refurbishment in 2004

Margo Valentine



Margo has won an impressive 28 club championship titles, relying on strong base line ground strokes. Margo's victories include ten Ladies Singles Championship wins during 1977 – 1996, spanning nineteen years. In Ladies Doubles, Margo celebrated 13 Ladies Doubles Titles in 1978 –2002, over a period of twenty five years, six of these titles partnering Fiona Adair and including 4 successive titles in 1978 –1981. In Mixed Doubles, Margo achieved five championship victories, including three back to back titles partnering Ian Henderson 1985-87. Margo captained the Ladies Team in 1988.

Partnering **Sinclair Campbell, Margo** won the Pringle Cup in 1985 and later that year, **Margo** and **Ian Henderson** won the Craigmillar Park Open Championship Mixed Doubles.

Patricia E. Brindle



Trish has been a tremendous servant to the club and wider tennis community over a number of years, and held office on the East of Scotland Committee for 14 years from 1992-2006, and elected Honorary East of Scotland President 1999 –2001, serving the sport at National level as an SLTA Councillor 1999-2005.

At Lomond Park, **Trish** served as Match Secretary 1980-81, Ladies Captain 1989-90, and on court won four Ladies Doubles Titles 1986-89 partnering **Trish Morse.** She was also a four times winner of the Hart Cup, partnering **Sinclair Campbell** and as part of a team of club junior coaches, helped develop the now institutional "Saturday morning nippers coaching sessions" which have provided a generation of players with the skills to enjoy the game.

Jacquie Edwards



Jacquie has recorded **39** Club Championship Titles, achieved over an impressive **30** year time span, 1990 to 2018, including **17** Ladies Singles Victories, with a run of 11 consecutive championships in the period 2008 - 2018. In Ladies Doubles, **Jacquie** has accumulated 10 Titles, and in Mixed Doubles, has recorded **12** Trophy wins, partnering **Hamish McGregor** on **10** occasions.

Jacquie has served a Ladies Club Captain 2008 – 2010

THE NORTHERN LIGHTS OF LOMOND PARK

Having installed 5 Elastol all-weather courts at a cost of E45,000 in 1982, Lomond Park Tennis Club last year completed the job with the erection of High Pressure Sodium floodlights on 2 courts at a further cost of E6,000. This "light"-hearted version of a well-known Scottish song tells the tale
